

The available ground is converted into play fields & courts for shuttle, volley Ball, kabaddi, and Basket Ball. The college hosts two All Kerala Inter-Collegiate Volley ball & Basket ball tournaments every year.

- A sports hostel is maintained which provides lodging and special food for thirty students in 3 games. (Basket ball, Volley ball & Kabaddi)
- Advanced coaching is given by qualified coaches employed by the college.

St. Xavier's college for Women, Aluva

Ideally located on the banks of the River Periyar at the heart of the Municipal Town Aluva, an integral part of Greater Cochin, St. Xavier's College is blessed with a fine blending of the rural and urban setting and style that facilitates the advantages of both. True to the goal it has set forth, the college reaches out to the rural backward segment of society that needs support and uplift. Every girt student who has had the privilege to be educated in this institution has left its portals as a mature, knowledgeable, conscientious and confident young woman, a fine product of our academic vision and accomplishment. We cherish a great tradition of dedication and service to the cause of total education – an education that imparts clarity of thought and knowledge, purity of mind and body and sanctity of vision.

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The Congregation of TERESIAN Carmalites under the patronage of the Arch Bishop of Varapuzha constitutes the Managing Body of St. Xavier's College Aluva. They run nine schools and a college with the motto, "Reach out and touch, oneself, others and Gad". St. Francis Girls High School and St. Xavier's College work in close proximity to achieve the desired goals. Higher education becomes meaningful only with relevance to the requirements of society. St. Xavier's College extends higher education to the backward minority, the rural folk of fishermen and farmer community. The objectives of this institution as stipulated in the college calendar are, "to produce intellectually illumined, socially upright, spiritually enlightened women, who in their specific roles develop right attitudes so that their relationships with others produce harmony, to achieve academic excellence, to develop personality, to develop spiritual and moral values and to instill social awareness and social justice.

Named after St. Francis Xavier, the epitome of knowledge and service. St. Xavier's College for Women started as a Junior college in 1964. It had a humble beginning of 238 students, 22 teachers and 15 classrooms. Rev. Sr. Redempta

M.A., M.S., Ph.D was the first Principal. The college underwent steady growth in the following years. Affiliation was abtained for Degree courses in Mathematics, Botany, Zoology, Economics and Malayalam. In course of time B.Sc Physics, B.A English Language and Literature and B.Com were introduced. With the help of U.G.C a hostel started functioning with 150 students in 1973. The first Post-graduate course was started in Commerce in 1984-85. A degree course in Chemistry and a U.G.C sponsored Vocational Degree Course in Communicative English started in the year 1995-96. Post Graduate course in Physics was sanctioned in 1998-99.

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At present, the college has 860 students at the predegree level, 1125 at under graduate and 49 at the post graduate levels. There are 78 members of the teaching staff and 50 in the non-teaching staff. The well run callege hostel, which can accommodate 250 students, now caters to the needs of 130 students. The College Magazine and the Manuscript Magazines bring out the literary and writing talents of our students. The Debating club and the Quiz club are very active and show their excellence in inter-collegiate competitions.

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It was in 1998 that we were informed about the process of Assessment and Accreditation of Institutions of High Education by NAAC, Bangalore, Participation of the Principal and a member of the faculty in the seminars conducted at St. Tresa's College, U.C College and the three day workshop on "Higher Education: Quality Issues" held in the Mahatma Gandhi University campus in November 1998, organized by College Development Council and guided by experts on the NAAC Peer team gave the real impetus to launch this challenging task and to go ahead with it. Under the inspiring guidance of the Principal, Staff meetings were held frequently and the faculties were made fully aware of the need for assuring and enhancing the quality of education we provide and for evaluating the strengths and weaknesses of our programmes,

performance, facilities and efforts. A Steering Committee with 10 members of the faculty was formed. ,

All the members of the staff whole heartedly co-operated with the preparation of the reports of the various activities and associations. Data collection for the profile and criteria was delegated to teams of two members each. Collation of information from various departments was done by the team work of each department under the HoD. The data collected under criterion

inputs and departmental inputs was consolidated into the final draft by a team of leachers. Members of the faculty were also involved in the computer printing, proof reading and correction. A team of five leachers worked on the self-analysis of the institution. Deadlines were set for each stage to acclerate the completion of the work within the stipulated time.

On the whole, the work has instilled a new sense of unity and team spirit in us. It became a creative activity with all the thrill and spirit of a joined endeavour for a common cause. The sincere support of the Principal, clerical staff and office; the close involvement and whole hearted co-operation of the faculty and the voluntary services offered by Mrs. Annie Varghese our retired colleague gave us the onward drive to complete this project in time.

It may be mentioned that as the space in the floppy disc supplied by NAAC is insufficient to accommodate comprehensive answers, we have been obliged to avail the option of collecting the data in Part I as printout framework. For an over all evaluation, the floppy disc with consolidated data has also been enclosed (Zip File).

Curricular Aspects

At the curricular level within the rigid framework of academic establishmentarian and statutory stipulations binding higher learning in the State, the college offers relevant options to its students in various disciplines. The updated syllabus offers to B.Sc Physics and Mathematics students, electives like Mechanics, Operational Research and Computer Programming. Similarly, B.A Economics students can choose from Optionals such as Money, Financial Institutions and Markets, Banking – central and commercial, Public Finance and Financial Management. By availing the flexibility offered by U.G.C (and now by University) the course components are properly synthesised with relevance to the local and regional needs. A few of our faculty members are on the Board of examiners. In 1995, the college launched a three-year degree course in Communicative English sponsored by the U.G.C. The course was designed to give maximum exposure to students to a wide variety of professional fields such as media, education, tourism, front-office jobs and entrepreneurship. As part of

this course On the Job Training is arranged as a beneficial apprenticeship. This has helped to establish societal relevance through an interactive process between the institution and the external agencies. M.Com students do research for their dessertation work in areas of modern industry and banking.

The college has furnished computer facilities to students to train them from the level of lay-man computer awareness to a thoroughly job-oriented Post Graduate Diploma course in Computer Application.

The college has the unique distinction of being a recognized centre of the National Open School offering non-conventional education for aspiring learners.

In designing and implementing the curriculum our focus is on the formation of socially useful citizens and the options are widened to get the most out of specified academic courses as well as to get insights into varied professional apportunities. The fact that we have to function within the restraints of infra structure, resources and the crippling frames of stero-typed courses and curriculum cannot be overlooked. We look forward to more of infra structural support and a liberalized curriculum design.

Teaching - Learning

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Teaching becomes a meaningful process only when the learner - need at the entry level is assessed. The Desired Behaviour requires parity of treatment with the Entry Behaviour. Being an affiliated college we have limitations in introducing new methods in entry level assessment. Such an assessment is partly achieved through the evaluation of the student - performance in the previous examinations and in the interview conducted before admission. In the other stages the student performance is evaluated through class assignments and the candidates are given the option to change over to the subject that suits them better. Students at low-performance level are supported by Remedial courses and those at high performance level are enriched through Personality development courses, seminars, debates and competitive examinations. Organized by the Dept. of Zoology a U.G.C sponsored inter-collegiate seminar on Aqua Culture, Environmental studies and Environmental laws was conducted on the 24th and 25th of February 1999. Students who out perform others are sent

for Campus-cream contest, National Talent Test and Maths Olympiad. Teachers thus motivate the students to adopt proper learning styles and to acquire learning abilities.

Teaching Schedule

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Keeping in view the number of working days in each term, each Head of the Department fixes the syllabus of that term. Departmental meetings are periodically arranged to confirm the effective and uniform execution of targets and to devise strategies of new teaching methods. Quarterly and Half Yearly Examinations are conducted on the University model for evaluation. Internal Assessment is done with utmost care under the supervision of a co-ordinator who collects the separate registers of marks from the class teachers. To elicit learner involvement, students are asked to prepare teaching aids like posters, charts, models, maps, graphs, specimens etc. It is experienced that learning is better when the material to be learnt has some personal relevance to the student. Some of the selected charts are hung in places like the Language Lab.

Audio-Visual facilities, Computer Centre and Language Lab

The college has well-equipped science laboratories and an audio-visual room with an Over-head Projector, T.V., V.C.P., Radio and Tape Recorder. Recorded video cassettes are played on the V.C.P for instructional purposes and for Personality Development. The tape recorder is used for the development of conversational skills, expressiveness and for techniques of effective dramatisation. In making use of these audio visual aids the concerned teaches work out a scheme of their own in accordance with their teaching purpose and syllabus.

There are twelve computers in the college, and a computer exclusively for the Dept. of Physics. The computer centre caters to the needs of students and teachers alike, and develops teaching aid software for various subjects.

The Language-Lab offers 18 student positions and two teacher positions with a central control Board and monitor. Students learn pronounciation and accent; the teacher and pupils interact at the corrective and practising levels with the help of standard phonetic tapes from agencies such as the B.B.C and CIEFL.

Evaluation

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Periodical assessment of the student - performance is brought out through the progress-card which is checked, evaluated and counter signed by the Principal. Being an affiliated college we do not have a performance monitoring system. But the college evaluates the performance of the faculty by supplying feedback forms to the students occasionally. Staff meetings are conducted regularly for teacher-performance appraisal. The P.T.A also supplies pertinent suggestions for improvement. New strategies of handling classes and its implementations are discussed in detail during the staff meetings.

The feedback mechanism had been functioning informally until 1999 through occasional questionairres and interactive tutorial hours. It was taken up formally in January 1999 through prepared questionairres and the effectiveness is assessed for necessary improvisation. We have plans to extend feedback outlets to parents as well. The P.T.A Executive Meetings and General Body Meetings voice the grievances and appreciation of parents. Taking cues from this, computer courses were started and college bus service was extended to new routes and M.Sc Physics started. We have applied for P.G courses in English and Malayalam and are aspiring to start Degree course in Microbiology.

It requires special mention that all the members of the teaching staff are available in the campus from 9.30 to 3.30. Inorder to ensure their presence and availability to the students, movement out of the campus is restricted with the prior sanction of HoD. We are absolutely free from one of the most undesirable developments in higher education, politicisation of campus. Ours is a uniquely politics – free campus. We have no teaching, non-teaching or student unions with political affiliations.

Research Consultancy and Extension

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Quality or Core-Competency is now the fouchstone of modern higher education to exist effectively in tune with the changing times. The paradigm shift from the teacher-centred to the learner-centred learning, highlights the thrust areas like research, consultancy and extension. What is needed is more of freedom from the academic straight-jacketing of time-bound debilitating frames of stereo-typed courses and curriculum.

Only a small percent of teachers are at present engaged in active research in the college. A limited few enjoy the facility of study-leave under F.I.P. No seed money or any other financial help is provided. Inspite of all these, 26 teacherss have completed their M.Phil and 4 teachers have completed Ph.D. Dr. Rathy of the Dept. of Malayalam and Dr. Nimala Paul of the Dept. Of Physics have secured Post-Doctoral Degrees. Dr. Rathy has made valuable contribution to the field of research by formulating some research tools on Methodology. Dept. of Malayalam, Zoology and Commerce have some publications to their credit. Malayalam Department has got 12 articles and one book; and Zoology and Commerce have three publications each. Projects are undertaken by depts. Like Malayalam which deal with daringly new ventures like exploration of true Kerala culture through folk-songs, primitive rhythms and multifarious dance forms indigenous to Kerala. The Dept. of Zoology is awaiting approval of a project on "Bio-systematics of Formicidae". Some of the members of the faculty serve as Resource persons and Research Guides. Prof. Tony Daniel (Dept. of Physical Education) was qualified as National Technical Official in Athletics. The N.C.C Officer Maj. C. Sumangala Devi was honoured with the "Commendation Award" from the Director General, N.C.C New Delhi in 1998.

The research output of teachers is scanty and it is recognized as a weak area. Women teachers do need more time and facilities to pursue research, instead of being over-loaded with unwieldy syllabus, university paper valuation and supervision. More opportunities should be opened up for effective utilization of our potential in the field of research and trained man - power in specialised areas.

Student Support and Progression

The financial dependence on the Government puts the college in restraints regarding the successful implementation of its plans and policies. The tocus is on the uplift of backward community and during admission, 60% seats are allotted to various categories including this section. The criteria for admission to the various courses are given in detail in the prospectus which is annually updated. According to the norms set by the university only 40% of the seats are given on general merit.

The college provides 15 endowment prizes for the academic excellence and 10 items of scholarship for fee-concession schemes on the basis of merit-cum-socio-economic backwardness. There are 158 Proficiency Prizes awarded by P.T.A to outstanding performers at curricular and extra curricular levels. The college runs a sports hostel with the aid of Kerala Sports Council Trivandrum to give free board and lodging to 30 students in Basket ball, Volley ball and Kabaddi. There are two memorial trophies instituted and annual tournaments held. One is Msgr. Augustin Maveli Memorial Trophy for Volley ball and the other Rev. Sr. Redempta Memorial Trophy for Basket ball.

Cultural Activities

The association of various disciplines [English, Malayalam, Commerce and Science subjects] promote the cultural activities of students. The unit of Kannan Devan Nature Club arranges various competitions, interactions, seminars and exhibitions. The debating club conducts inter-departmental debates and delegates teams for inter-collegiate debate competitions. Parliament awareness is created by conducting Mock-Assembly, Mock-Parliament etc. Inter departmental quiz competitions and inter-action sessions with eminent personalities are arranged. Cultural exchange between the East and the West was facilitated by arranging an interaction session with Joe Beaudit Cripps – the Australian Poetess. "The Xavierian" the college magazine gives insight into the activities, the dreams and aspirations of students. Every year the college conducts competitions in cultural items and the outstanding performers are sent for University Youth Festival. It is to be mentioned with pride that our students

bagged first and second prizes in the North Zone Youth Festival conducted by M.G. University held from 18th to 20th of February 1999 at Kolenchery. Special training is given to the participants with the help of paid professionals. Onam and Christmas are celebrated in a colourful festive manner in the campus.

The Mathrubhoomi study circle "Sarga Vedi" was inaugurated in the college in the month of February and enriching sessions on leadership, creative writing and personality development were held. "Sarga vedi" is expected to be operational effectively in the years to come.

The Alumni Association

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OSAX [Old Students Association of St. Xavier's College] was started in 1990. Inspite of the initial slump it has been renewed with the meeting conducted on 3rd February 1999 presided by the Principal who is also an old student of this college. About 100 participants registered their names and a new executive committee was formed for the proper functioning of the Association. FESTA [Former English Students Association] functions under the auspices of the Department of English. It is regretted that the exact data of student-progression to P.G and employment is not kept in proper record. We have not been able to tap the funds of Alumni for growth and expansion. The notification published in the newspaper for collecting information on student progression did not receive the expected response. Efforts are taken with renewed vigour to make the Alumni Association stronger so that the institution can grow on its aid and support.

Infra Structure and Learning Resources

The handling of the infra structural facilities of the college keeps in view the maximum utilization of the available facilities providing scope for further expansion. The construction of the New Block. New Basket ball Court and Language Lab have been accomplished on these lines for optimal utilization in the field of arts, science and sports. Meticulous planning is made in resource management with regard to prudent utilization of space and other facilities at no risk to the targetted convenience, hygiene and aesthetic perfection. Though

the library is not computerised, we have reprographical facilities. The college co-operative store and the canteen work in full swing for student welfare. The college hostel can accommodate 250 students. The computer centre, the well-equipped Science Laboratories and the Language Lab are real assets of the college. The Department of Physical Education maintains a health club equipped with light weight training equipments.

Economically backward students are helped through Student Aid Fund and exceptional academic performance in various disciplines are encouraged through Endowment Awards. Ten items of scholarship and a few fee concession schemes are offered to the students. Assessment is made on the basis of merit cum socio-economic backwardness. The P.T.A fund is also utilized for proper encouragement and recognition for creditable achievements in curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

Grievance Redressal Cell

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As it is the way with any diversified establishment, grievances arise and have to be attended to. The College Grievance Redressal Cell functions effectively both at the Departmental and College Council level for the benefit of the students. At present there is no formal grievance redressal cell for employees.

Resource Constraints

During the last six years the budget for higher education has been cut drastically in the context of economic crisis and the need for allocation to other sectors. We have experienced acute shortage of funds for timely repair, renovation and expansion. Our Old Block Building needs total demolition and re-construction. There is no common staff room for the teaching staff. We need more class rooms, and with the limited space we are struggling hard to materialise another vital need — a Non – Resident centre for students.

Supporting Services and Extension Activities

The N.C.C, N.S.S, Planning forum, Career Guidance Cell, Women's Cell, National Open School, Nature Club and Legal Literacy Centre are the supporting services channelising student potential.

N.C.C.

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The pioneering work taken up by the unit of N.C.C under 4(K) Girls 8N, starting from 1971 is still kept up with its vigour, earnestness and efficiency. Our cadets actively participated in Annual Training camps, Hospital Attachment Course in Indian Navel Hospitalship Sanjeevani, basic leadership courses (New Delhi, Santhi Niketan, Gwalior etc), National Integration Camps(Andaman, Agra, Allahabad etc.), and courses in Mountaineering, Rock climbing, Trekking etc. Every year a cadet from our college represents Kerala in the Republic Day Parade at New Delhi. This year one of our students secured the Cherry Blossom award for the best turn out and another a gold medal for the cultural activities. N.C.C scholarship and Chandrashekharan Nair Gold medal are awarded to our students for outstanding academic performance. Our cadets are serving as officers in the Indian Navy, as defence personnel etc. Some of the cadets have shown their excellence by getting selected into the Indian team to U.K under the Youth Exchange Programme in 1997 and by being ranked as the best cadet from Kerala in the Basic Leadership Course held at New Delhi. Hand in hand with the N.S.S Unit, N.C.C is active in rendering social service. They have stretched their activities in various directions such as health and hygiene awareness. medical camps, adult education and literacy, blood donation camp, aids awareness campaigns and afforestation.

N.S.S

The N.S.S of our college has got a brilliant record ever since it started functioning in the year 1976-77. The college has 4 N.S.S units with more than 300 volunteers and 4 programme officers. Our students have actively participated in seminars and workshops on Legal Awareness, Aids Awareness (CUSAT), Pulse Polio Immunization, Survey on Japan Fever, Nature camps, Pre-RD camp (Chennai)

etc. We have fullfilled the major activities of National Service schemes like Literacy programme, consumer protection, environment protection, protection of women's rights and abolition of drugs and alcohol consumption. The involvement of N.S.S in the "Save Periyar Project" with the planting of 1500 saplings to prevent soil erosion and the series of social service activities chalked out in connection with the Golden Jubilee Celebrations of Indian Independence are really commendable. It has adopted Madhavapuram Colony for uplift and support and is offering services to SOS Village, Choondy.

Career Guldance Cell, Women's Cell

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Though there is no Placement Cell, The Career Guidance Cell conducts model competitive tests, mock-interviews, group discussions etc. and directs students to centres such as LIS, People Plus which are situated in Ernakulam District. Under its initiative an inter-collegiate seminar on 'Personality Development and Career Guidance for Women Students' was conducted on 22nd and 23nd of February. The Women's cell holds seminars and discussions on current social and political issues related to women. It has contributed 10 sewing machines to poor women in the locality. Its effort to elevate the status of womanhood and motherhood are reflected in observing days like Mother's Day and Grand Parent's Day. Since 1998-99 is dedicated to grand parents, on 10th February students paid a visit to the Old Age Home at Chunagamvely with gifts as tokens of caring and sharing. The women's cell is planning to adopt this Old Age Home for continuous service and support.

Planning Forum, Nature Club

The Planning Forum conducts seminars and offers laudable service towards inculcating thrift and saving habit in students and instils in them an awareness of the prevailing economic developments. The unit of Kannan Devan Nature Club sponsored by KNDC works towards fostering a new eco-awareness and the need for a pollution free environment. Plants are supplied for afforestation and exhibitions are conducted on rare medicinal herbs and plants.

National Open School

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The inauguration of the National Open School in 1998-99 opened new vistas of effective dissemination of information related to Distance Education and Open Learning. Nothing fits more into the modern scenario of globalization and information technology. The prioritised client groups include girls and women, scheduled tribes, rural folk, urban poor, unemployed and the physically and mentally disadvantaged. Apart from the senior secondary course that is functioning now, we have applied for vocational courses like computer, library science, secretarial practice and beauty care.

To the weak disadvantaged SC/ST students of the college, special coaching classes in English and Computer awareness are offered with the aid of UGC. Thus the extension activities towards the uplift of the weak community are wide and varied and elude proper consolidation.

Organization and Management

The excellence of an institution is judged not in terms of its physical growth but in terms of the efficient and proper utilization of the available facilities through a well-organized set up. The organization and management of the college is based on the co-ordinated efforts of the Xaverian Community which includes the staff, students, guardians the former students and the general public.

The governing body, constituted by the Mother General of C.T.C., Local Manager, The Principal, The Bursar and Nominees of the Manager meets twice a year and monitors the overall progress. The recruitment of employees is done without compromising eligibility norms. The important policy decisions are made by the college council consisting of the Principal, Heads of Departments and two elected members of the teaching staff. The Staff Executive Committee, the Association of the Teaching staff, Non-teaching staff and Parent Teacher Association help in co-ordinating, monitoring and executing the activities. While the Heads of Department are responsible for the efficient functioning of their

respective departments, the Principal and the Office Superintendent supervise and evaluate works allotted to the non-teaching staff.

The Parent - Teacher Association

The Parent Teacher Association is an active body which puts forward relevant suggestions and directions towards better management. The following contributions made by the P.T.A are thankfully acknowledged here.

- Funds for the construction of the auditorium.
- Allotment of special funds for the sports-stars and the proficiency winners.
- Financing the conduct of the half-yearly examinations.
- The setting up of the infra structure for the newly sanctioned courses.
- The installation of the computer centre.
- Appointment of adhoc staff.
- Publication of college magazine
- General maintenance

In fact the college witnessed marked growth and progress only after the formation of P.T.A which became operational from 1982 onwards.

The Sports - Scenario

The achievements of the college in sports and games make a brilliant history. The incentives and support given to our sports stars are sports hostel, advanced coaching by qualified Coaches, Cash-awards to the financially backward and gold medals to outstanding players. We have achieved outstanding results. The achievements of our players in the year 98-99 deserve special mention. By being winners in 18 Inter-collegiate Tournaments and more than 20 All Kerala Tournaments, our Basket ball, Volley ball and Kabaddi teams have brought laurels to their almamater. 3 of our players are qualified to participate in the 5th National Games held at Imphal.

4 of our Volley ball players represented M.G. University at the All India Inter-University Tournament and became winners and one of them captained the University Team. The HoD of Physical Education Department, Prof. Tony Daniel is selected as the Technical Official in 9 International athletic meets and recently in the 5th National Games. He is also included as a member/official of

the organising Committee for conducting various National and International Seminars.

Other good practices

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Religious and Moral Instruction classes are conducted regularly. Every day the college session begins with a prayer. The activities of the Catholic students include monthly First Friday Mass and weekly prayer meetings. Annual retreats are conducted for Pre-degree and Degree students and special counselling-sessions are extended to all students. Spiritual seminars and workshops are also conducted for the teaching and the non-teaching staff. Our students take active participation in "Campus Meets" by Jesus Youth and the life orientation programme.

Students are encouraged to take part in charitable activities that are extended to the sick, suffering and less fortunate. A voluntary contribution of Rs.56,000 to the Cancer Cure Fund was handed over to Mar Gregorious Karunya Nilayam, Gandhi Nagar Kottayam. An amount of Rs. 12,500 was offered to an employee in a neighbouring establishment for kidney transplantation.

Conclusion

The Accreditation process gave us the unique experience of a thoroughly introspective evaluation of our curricular and extra-curricular activities since the beginning of the college. An objective evaluation of our facilities, resources and potential has been made possible in an unprecedented way and we are immensely thankful to NAAC for this. At the same time we got an opportunity to understand our inadequacies at various levels in the course of the evaluation.

The ideal location, well furnished laboratories, student hostel, computer centre, sports hostel, canteen, college buses, Volley ball and Basket ball courts are our assets at the infra structural level. The totally politics-free campus, the avowed commitment to the vulnerable sections of society with focus on Women, well organized and dedicated N.C.C and N.S.S units and the totally involved PTA are our plus points on the functional side. Effective management and the concerted efforts of the Xaverian fraternity have contributed signally to all the achievements till date, and we are proud of them.

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This does not in any way make us overlook our inadequacies and limitations. Infra structural inadequacies such as buildings in urgent need of renovation, new buildings for classrooms, finance for schemes such as a non-residential centre, common staff room, internet facilities and a conference hall require immediate and urgent attention. At the academic level we have not been able to exploit our immense potential in areas such as research and updating of teaching skills. We have been made more aware of the need to improve quality, which has become the touchstone of higher education. Inflexible and stereotyped teaching modules for conventional courses have always been a stumbling block in our educational endeavour. Re-orienting and sensitising programmes for the functional excellence of the teaching and non-teaching sections of our college are urgently required.

It may be mentioned that as a direct effect of this self-appraisal, we have taken initiatives to launch a comprehensive feed-back mechanism and a renovated Alumni. This has resulted in a more student-centred academic vision as against the former teacher-centred exercise and a socially oriented student training and approach.

It is our earnest hope that this self-evaluation would evoke adequate appreciation, direction and help from the UGC and its functionaries during the plan period. The entire system of higher education being in need of renewal, reorganisation and revitalsation, we wish that we would be able to fulfil our commitment and be successful in carrying out our educational mission.
