The Institution

St. Xavier's College is situated on the enchanting banks of river Periyar, in the semi-urban area of Aluva, nearly 35 Kilometers away from Kochi, Kerala. The College was established in 1964. It is a First Grade College managed by The Congregation of Teresian Carmelites and is affiliated to Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam, Kerala. The College was reaccredited with B++ grade by NAAC in 2006.

The College is a Minority educational institution recognized by National Minority Commission, covered under article 30 of the Constitution of India. The College also comes under 2(f) and 12(b) of the UGC Act. It caters to the higher education needs of the girls from the marginalized minority communities such as Latin Catholics, Muslims, and Scheduled Castes and Tribes.

St. Xavier's College is named after St. Francis Xavier, an outstanding Jesuit professor, educationalist and a great missionary of the 15th Century. This is the only Women's College in this area and is situated in the Aluva town on the banks of river Periyar at the entry point to the hilly areas of Kerala. This educational institution started functioning with a strength of 238 pre-degree students in four batches and 22 members of teaching staff. It was upgraded as a degree College in 1968. It now offers UG courses in Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Zoology Vocational, Botany, English Literature, Communicative English, Malayalam, Economics and Commerce. Post graduate courses in Commerce, Physics, English, and Microbiology were started in 1984, 1998, and 2001 respectively. The Everonn Virtual Class Room gives access to the students to attend lecture sessions of professors from other universities. The College conducts five skill – oriented add-on courses in order to equip students to face the challenges in the field of employment.

St. Xavier' College is extending its services not only to the academic field but also to community building programmes. In collaboration with the Kerala Action force, the IMA, the municipality and the local community, it conducts various programmes to help the poor, the widows, and the homeless.

Since the previous reaccreditation, the College has improved academically and in infrastructure. New courses, and departments, and more space for various departments have been added. New technological innovations have been introduced in teaching and learning.

The College has now completed five years since the last reaccreditation. Now it is time for the institution to have an evaluation and assessment of its strength and weakness, opportunities and threats for further improvement.

Part II: Evaluative Report

a. Executive Summary

St. Xavier's College for Women, Aluva, is owned and administered by the Teresian Carmelites, a religious congregation of dedicated nuns. The College is named after the great Jesuit missionary, St. Francis Xavier. The social reformer and the foundress of the congregation of Teresian Carmelites, Servant of God Mother Eliswa Vakayil started to educate girls in the beginning of 19th century responding to the call of the needs of the society in Kerala at that time. This higher education institution is a proof of her vision of educating women towards empowerment and spiritual enrichment.

This college started functioning on 6th July 1964 with four batches of predegree classes with a total strength of 238 students and 22 teaching faculty. It was upgraded to the status of a degree college in 1968. It now offers 11 UG courses, and 4 Post-graduate courses. As an institute of higher education, St. Xavier's College has 47 years of dedicated service to the community.

The college was first accredited in 1999 at 4 star level by NAAC. In 2006 the College was reaccredited at B++ grade. A Research cell was introduced in 2007. The Department of Microbiology with UG course was regularized. A UGC Certificate Course in Human Rights and Duties along with add-on programme was started.

The college emblem is redesigned to focus on the path of knowledge, love and service, being represented symbolically by the book, hand and the lighted lamp. The introduction of Houses and Clubs, institutionalization of Mentoring and introduction of uniform were the major milestones in the history of the college.

Improvements in infrastructural facilities were remarkable during the academic years following the last reaccreditation. The construction of the fourth floor, in the St. Joseph's Block has been completed. A fire alarm, and control and extinguishing system have been installed. In the Jesus Block, the office section was modernized to improve the efficient functioning of the office. Arrangement of class rooms was done to improve the efficient functioning. The PG departments have their own seminar halls with LCDs. Infrastructure facilities were improved by

installing a generator, lift, and also by tarring the road in the campus. Rain water harvesting and vermin compost have been installed to make the campus eco-friendly. For convenient and safe transportation, the college has introduced two bus services. The canteen which is clean, hygienic, modern, spacious and comfortable is a place where the students flock to enjoy their snacks and involve themselves in debates and discussions. The open ground around the basket ball and volleyball courts have comfortable shaded areas for recreation of students. A cafeteria like common room in the quiet surroundings is an apt place for students to do silent reading. Xaverian Kids Centre materialized with the funding of UGC is very helpful for the faculty with small children.

For future academic development, applications have been submitted to the University for the demand oriented PG courses in Mathematics, Economics, Communicative English and Malayalam and UG courses in Sociology, Hindi, B.Com. with Computer Application, and B. Com with Journalism. Since the college is an affiliated college, it follows the M.G. University curriculum. The college admits students strictly on the basis of the norms of the University and the Government and at present on rolls there are 1408 students. There are 47 permanent faculty members in the college. Out of this 14 have Ph.D. as the highest qualification and 13 have M. Phil as the highest qualification. Four of the faculty members have availed FIP. In addition there are 34 temporary Assistant Professors and 49 administrative staff. A major research project is carried out in the college by our retired faculty Dr. Sr. Karmaly K.A. During the last five years ten UGC sponsored National Seminars were conducted by various departments.

A great change has occurred in the admission procedure with the introduction of credit and semester pattern by the M.G. University. The academic challenge, for both students and teachers, has increased after this and the college has performed a supportive role in helping both of them attain their respective goals. A Remedial Coaching for Minority girls was carried out with a funding of four lakhs from the Ministry of Minority Rights.

The achievements of NSS and NCC are remarkable for the last five years. The NSS unit of the college could bag the awards for the Best Unit, Best Teacher Co-ordinator, Best Student Volunteer and the Best Supporting Principal for the year

2010-2011. The NCC unit of the college could secure 2012 Overall Championship in Seven Kerala Girls Battalion, NCC Unit Trissur and Ashida of II English Literature is selected as the Best Cadet.

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

1.1 Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 State the vision and mission of the institution, and how it is communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders?

Vision:

To uplift the educational, social, cultural, and vocational status of women by empowering them with academic excellence, personality development, and spiritual enlightenment.

St. Xavier's College aims at the full-fledged development of young women enabling them to live a richer life, fulfilling their individual and social responsibilities. Since the college focuses on women empowerment, the entire activities (academic, curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular) centre around this main objective. By catering to a student population that hails from rural and semi urban background, special efforts are taken to evaluate them at the entry level to gauge their potential and to achieve possible level of competence. Confidence is infused into them through a number of personality development programmes and seminars. In order to make them aware of effective role in society and social responsibility, a number of community related programmes are organized. Value education is rendered through spiritual formation sessions. Efforts are taken to foster harmonious relationship and sense of relatedness to the environment and to make them aware of current environmental hazards.

Mission:

The mission of the college is to have creative, self reliant, technology driven women with humane values and traditional culture with an empowered outlook.

Through the academic community consisting of faculty, staff and students the college create, integrate, and disseminate knowledge, and foster in the students critical thinking and other intellectual skills along with the attitudes and abilities that enable them to live as educated, tolerant, and empowered leaders disseminating values to the society.

Every young woman with a receptive mind finds her life in the campus a rewarding and stimulating experience. The legacy of St. Xavier inspires the young women to cherish traditional values and at the same time to be empowered to meet the challenges of a fast changing world.

The vision and mission are communicated through the college diary which is given to each student and faculty. The academic classes, continuous friendly interactions, timely help, personal availability and assistance of the faculty and non-teaching staff all promote the vision and mission of St. Xavier's College.

1.1.2 How does the mission statement reflect the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientation?

The foundress Rev. Mother Eliswa took prophetic daring steps to educate girls in order to educate families and thereby empower the society with faith, morality and culture in 19th century when educating girls was considered as an illegal act deserving punishment. From the time of its inception, St. Xavier's College empowers the women of minority groups enabling them to live a richer life, fulfilling their individual and social responsibilities. The mission is definitely reflected and fulfilled in the tradition of the institution of having a beautiful involvement of retired staff (RELAX), alumni (OSAX) and retired non-teaching staff (RENTAX) in the day-to-day functioning of the College.

1.1.3 Are the academic programmes in line with the institution's goals and objectives? If yes, give details on how the curricula developed/ adopted,

address the needs of the society and have relevance to the regional/ national and global trends and developmental needs? (access to the Disadvantaged, Equity, Self development, Community and National Development, Ecology and environment, Value orientation, Employment, ICT introduction, Global and National demands and so on)

The academic programmes are developed by the University which is adhered to by the college. The conventional arts and science courses are strengthened through the use of ICT by the faculty to be more useful to the learners. Various seminars and workshops in different disciplines are conducted to keep up with the fast changing pace of knowledge. Interdisciplinary programmes and open course system introduced in tune with the university system—give the students exposure to various new disciplines.

Add on courses in E-Banking, Security Analysis, Computer Application, Human Rights Education and Tally is offered to the students throwing open the window of knowledge to global needs and standards. Virtual classroom courses such as Bio-informatics, CCNA, Software Testing and Placement Support and English Enhancement Courses are also courses which meet the challenges of modern days.

The camps conducted by the NSS unit in rural villages, give access to the students to be with the disadvantaged communities and get involved in National development programmes.

In every class admission is offered to 20 percentage of SC/ST students, 20 percentage of Latin Catholic minority community students, 20 percentages from other minority groups, and 40 percentage to general merit. The students get a chance to mingle with disadvantaged groups and practice equity and exchange of culture.

Moral science and catechism classes are included in the extra curriculum giving adequate value education.

The Career Guidance Cell in the college functions as a mediator between different recruiting agencies and gives students ample opportunity for employment facilities in the state and country. Cyber net knowledge in addition to their conventional degrees enables them to get employed in government, quasi-government and private firms.

1.1.4 How does the curriculum cater to inclusion/integration of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) in the curriculum, for equipping the students to compete in the global employment markets?

All the departments have a LCD equipped seminar hall. Students are taught communication skills with the help of ICT. ICT has become an inevitable part of the curriculum. Improvements in the infrastructure facilities have helped various departments to give individual care to learners and use ICT in an efficient way.

The language lab in the English dept is open for all students and courses are offered to improve their communication skill.

Power point presentation skills are taught with the help of Computer lab in the Physics department. ICT enabled viva is conducted for all the first year degree students to enable them to face interviews in future. The project work that is part of the curriculum for both UG and PG, On the job training, and the language lab facilities give adequate exposure to the widening horizons of knowledge.

1.1.5 Specify the initiatives and contributions of the institution in the curriculum design and development process. Two of our faculty members were in the board of studies of M.G. University which plays a major role in designing curriculum and syllabus of the

colleges. Three of our Associate Professors were subject experts of M.G. University for faculty appointment. Three books written by Dr. Shyla Papoo of the Hindi department are part of the revised syllabus of M.G. University. For one year our college was the centre for centralized paper valuation camp of M.G. University. The self financing courses in Communicative English and Micro-biology are need based courses and the outgoing students are employed within and outside India.

Feed back is collected every year from students and this is an innovative practice in improving teaching learning process.

Within the timetable an hour in every week is allotted for Mentoring and it becomes a forum for non academic teacher student interaction.

a) Core options

Core subjects are in accordance with the approved programmes of the M.G University. Plus two Science students can opt for B.Sc. Physics,

Chemistry, Mathematics, Zoology, Zoology (V), Botany and B.A. English, Communicative English and Malayalam. Plus two arts students can opt for B.Com, B.A. Economics, English, Communicative English and Malayalam. The under graduate students have four options for PG respectively Physics, Microbiology, English and Commerce.

b) Elective options

Electives are available for every degree and PG course. Departments select them taking into consideration the demand and current need. The electives in core course are selected by the department. The open course system as part of the CBCSS system gives students freedom to select Electives from outside disciplines. The project work that is undertaken in the curriculum is need based and job-oriented.

c) Add on course options

UGC sponsored Add on courses include Students can opt for any of the add-on courses and pursue it along with the regular degree programmes.

d) Interdisciplinary courses

The open course system implemented by the university for the 5th semester degree students makes it mandatory that a student should study an open course from any other discipline other than the one offered by the home department. The academic flexibility and exposure has increased with this. It also gives the faculty an opportunity to encounter the academic need of students of various disciplines. Each department has taken care in implementing this change and a co-ordinator is chosen for the proper conduct of these courses. The complementary courses in the conventional degrees courses give an access to PG course in another discipline.

e) Flexibility to the students to move from one discipline to another

Flexibility to move from one discipline to another is there in the curriculum. For Mathematics and Physics students with complementary

course in Statistics can go for P.G. in Statistics. All science and arts students with English as first language can go for PG in English, similarly all science and arts students with the second language as Hindi and Malayalam can go for PG in Hindi and Malayalam. This flexibility is limited to the extend implemented by the M.G University norms.

f) Flexibility to pursue the programme with reference to the time frame

(flexible time for completion)

The regular time frame for completion of UG and PG programmes are 3 and 2 years respectively. However for valid reason there is flexibility of time for completion provided the University norms are satisfied.

- 1.2.3 Give details of the programmes and other facilities available for international Students (if any)
 - B.A. Communicative English and B.Sc. and M.Sc. Microbiology are courses which can attract international students.
- 1.2.4 Does the institution offer any self-financed programmes in the institution? If yes, list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification and salary etc.
 - B.A. Communicative English and M.Sc. Microbiology are self financed programmes offered at St. Xavier's College for Women, Aluva.

Admissions for the above courses are carried out according to the norms of the university. For B.A. Communicative English 50% of the seats are filled by the university and the other 50% by the college as per merit list. For M.Sc. Microbiology selection is based on the entrance test conducted by the university, and interview. The Curriculum for these courses are given by the university. The fee structure and schedule are as per the University and state guidelines. The regular teachers are not permitted to teach in the self-financing courses. Salary for faculty for the self-financing courses is fixed

by the management. There is no compromise on the quality of the faculty members.

1.3 Feedback on Curriculum

1.3.1. How does the college obtain feedback on curriculum from:

a) Students

Feedback has emerged as a means to facilitate both the learning and teaching process. Teaching feedback involve, an environment of trust, classifying expectations, gathering significant information, adjusting teaching as needed. A questionnaire is given to each class and the data is collected and analyzed. The personal interaction between the teacher and the students builds a cordial learning atmosphere. Effective feedback helps students to develop their understanding and improve their performance.

b) Alumni

OSAX (Old Students Association of St. Xavier's) gives the information in their annual meet in the college and also as and when they visit the home department. The online community sites give ample opportunity for alumni feedback. The alumni feedback column in the official web site of the college is very helpful in getting feedbacks.

c) Parents

PTA annual body meeting is an open forum where the parents freely express their opinions about the institute and teaching methods. They raise their doubts and they demand changes. During the 'Open Houses' sessions they meet individual teachers to get the feedback about the progress in learning of their ward. The parents are given freedom to meet the Principal and teachers during working hours. They can also contact the HOD's and the class teacher over the phone. Parents are called for counselling in certain cases to understand and help the students.

d) Teachers

Teachers are constantly giving students feedback on their learning. The way the teachers respond when students contribute in lectures, seminars and assignment tell them something about the progress of their learning. Asking students to summarise a lecture or to compare notes or answers with the person sitting next to them are simple ways of offering some insight into their level of understanding. Feedback should be an ongoing process. To be effective, students need to receive feedback in time to make use of it.

e) *Peer*

Students gain useful feedback from each other and through reflecting on their own learning. Providing opportunities for peer and self assessment ensures that feedback is not something that happens at the end of a course but is an ongoing part of the learning process.

f) Employers / industries

Feed-back is collected from authorities of institutes/industries where our students are employed. Feed-back is also collected from authorities of the institutes where students go for on-the-job training sessions.

g) Academic peers

The formal feedback from academic community is collected during seminar session in a prescribed format. Informal feedback is collected during personal interaction during centralized valuation camps.

h) Community

Community feedback is mainly collected through personal interaction.

1.3.2. How is the above feedback analyzed and the outcome / suggestions used for continuous improvements, and communicated to the affiliating university for appropriate inclusion?

The feed-backs are collected and analyzed statistically and remedial measures are taken by the College Council and the Grievance Redressal Cell. Teachers who are in the Board of Studies of the M.G. University express their views during the formal meetings regarding the curriculum development, evaluation and assessment.

1.4 Curriculum update

1.4.1 What is the frequency and the basis for syllabus revision and what are the major revisions made during the last two years?

Syllabus revision is done by M.G. University. It takes place once in five years. A drastic revision from annual to semester stream took place when the university introduced credit and semester pattern in 2009.

Quality teaching is focused on student achievement and the results of the input of the students at entry level are compared with the output of the outgoing students.

The language and practices of the classroom are inclusive of all students.

Teaching is structured to support active learning collaborative group work with individual accountability mechanisms and student demonstrates active co-operative and social skills learning process.

Cultural practices are made transparent and available to all.

1.4.2 How does the institution ensure that the curriculum bears a thrust on core values adopted by NAAC?

Within the curriculum itself college has introduced regular teaching hours for mentoring and moral education which inculcate value system among students. In order to foster global competence among students add-on courses in E-Banking, Security Analysis, Computer Application and Tally along with Virtual Classroom Courses such as Bio-informatics, CCNA, Software Testing, Placement Support and English Enhancement Courses are conducted in addition to traditional course as per the university norms.

These courses are ICT enabled, promoting the use of technology. When we educate girls, the education is for families and thus the society also benefits. Employed women contribute much in various fields for national development. They also contribute to national income and GDP.

1.4.3 Does the institution use the guidelines of statutory bodies (UGC/AICTE / State Councils of HE and other bodies) for developing and/or restructuring the curricula?

The college is affiliated to M.G University. Thus it has to obey the guidelines of the University in developing and restructuring the curricula. The Curriculum followed is revised, including inter-disciplinary areas of studies catering to the modern needs for employment. The transparency in admission as per the norms of the university and government ensure equity among students.

The Principal, Vice Principal, faculty and non-teaching staff are appointed as per the norms and guidelines made by the Directorate of Higher Education.

UGC sponsored add-on courses are conducted using the guidelines of UGC. The classrooms and learning facilities are devised according to UGC norms.

1.4.4 How are the existing courses modified to meet the emerging/ changing national and global trends?

The existing courses are modified in the new semester system. This gives opportunities for inter-disciplinary learning. There are two internal examinations in each semester which reduce the fear of exams of the students. The semester end examination is faced by the students in a calm way with very little examination fears. The credit and semester pattern enhances inter-intuitional mobility and gives an opportunity to be enrolled in various universities. Duration of the semester, number of contact hour per paper, per semester and relative weightage of continuous internal assessment are introduced effectively.

1.5 Best Practices in Curricular Aspects

1.5.1 What are the quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures undertaken by the institution during the last five years in curricular aspects?

Additional learning materials from the internet and library based on the syllabus are provided. National seminars, quiz competitions and workshops are arranged periodically to give students an awareness of the global trends on the subject. Educational tours are undertaken to give students a wide exposure and to enhance the learning process. Group field work is carried out on the topics discussed in an around the college.

Teaching faculty is also encouraged to participate in seminars and workshops. The internet facility is made available to all departments. ICT enabled seminar halls, English teaching Language Labs with LCD projectors help in quality sustenance. The improvements in the infrastructure facilities with additional seminar halls and labs will also have a positive effect on teaching and learning. The IQAC of the college functions as an advisory body to evaluate the functioning of the college and to suggest areas for improvements in curricular, extra-curricular and administrative aspects.

1.5.2 What best practices in 'Curricular Aspects' have been planned/implemented by the institution?

Feedback on curriculum is invited from the faculty, alumni, parents and students on various aspects. Applications have been submitted to the university for the UG course in Fine Arts and Fashion Technology, B.Com (Tourism) and PG courses in Mathematics, Economics, Communicative English and Malayalam. Need based add on courses are conducted in the college and the College Computer Centre. The college is trying to upgrade itself to a research centre.

Groups are formed to work as caring, inclusive and cohesive learning groups. The atmosphere of student motivation is optimized and aspirations are supported. Caring and support are generated through different practices like mentoring, class-in-charge, advisors and other interaction (moral science, catechisms, and cultural programmes among the faculty and students.

The language and practices of the classroom are inclusive to all students. Teaching is structured to support active learning and collaborative group work with individual accountability mechanisms and students demonstrate active cooperation and social skills learning process.

Quality homework will have positive impact on student learning. The effectiveness of the homework is dependent upon the teachers' skill to construct resource. Feedback is collected upon the approximate home work tasks that support in class learning. The fast learners are motivated to help the slow learners. The support from the parents is sought to align a link to support the student learning and then the skill development can be optimized. Curriculum is interconnected and links are made to real life experience.

2. What are the other quality sustenance and enhancement measures undertaken by the institution since the previous Assessment and Accreditation with regard to Curricular Aspects?

The Curriculum, revised by the University, is more learner friendly, where the students have to go in search of knowledge through their faculty for presenting their assignments, projects and seminars. The Open Course which is

compulsory for all the students of the fifth Semester gives a better exposure to areas of interest, which the student is given liberty to choose from a wide range of topics. The students have become more oriented towards research programmes. Mentoring and Value education are introduced within the curriculum with one special hour set apart every week for it, which strengthens the mental capacity and morale of the students.

 - Announcement in parishes regarding the dates of admission
 - Grace marks for alumni
 - Institutional web site for international students
- 2.1.2 How are the students selected for admission to the following courses? Give the cut off percentage for admission at the entry level
 - a) General
 - b) Professional
 - c) Vocational

For the general merit quota consisting of 40% and the 20% reserved for SC/ST candidates of the total admission is made through the Central Allotment Scheme of the M.G University. The remaining 20% is admitted on merit basis from the minority community of Latin Catholics and Anglo

Indians for which they have to submit, special application in the college. The remaining 20% seats are allotted by the management to students who are in need of pursuing higher education but have no financial support.

The cut of level of marks varies from year to year and from group to group according to the norms of the University.

2.1.3 How does the Institution ensure transparency in the Admission process?

Students are admitted as per the University norms and guidelines. The list of students seeking admission is displayed on the notice board for public scrutiny. If there are discrepancies, the same can be brought to the notice of the Principal, who will look into the grievance and rectify it. Admission is made under the following quota system - 20percentage of SC/ST students, 20 percentage of community students, 20 percentage of minority students from other groups, and 40 percentage from general category.

2.1.4 How do you promote access to ensure equity?

a) Students from disadvantaged community

20% of the seats are reserved for SC/ST community. Care is taken to see that every SC/ST candidates who has put in application is given the chance.

20% of seats are reserved for the minority community of Latin Catholics and Anglo Indians in which category there are always large number of applications. 20% of the management seats are given to other minority communities like Muslims and Ezhavas who are in the disadvantage category living in the area surrounding the college.

b) Women

Being a Women's college all the seats are exclusively for women.

c) Differently-abled

Seats are reserved for differently-abled students like the blind, the physically disadvantaged and mentally slightly challenged in every class.

d) Economically-weaker sections

Management seats are given to economically-weaker sections of all communities like fishermen and to those in Kumara pillai commission report (KPCR), Seetharam Jindal foundation (BPL students), and all first generation learners.

e) Sports personnel

St. Xavier's is well known for sports especially – Volleyball, Basketball and Kabaddi, Swimming and Athletics and the individual items in the university. As most of these sports students are usually from very poor and rural families, they are given financial support. During admission process they are given freedom all support to select their desired subject within the norms of the University.

f) Any other (specify)

- 1. Students with cultural talents are admitted in cultural quota.
- 2. Students from Lakshadweep Islands are given admission as per the government norms.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs

2.2.1 Is there a provision for assessing the students' knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If yes, give details on the strategies of the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the incoming students for enabling them to cope with the programme to which they are enrolled.

An Orientation programme is conducted for all the first year students as well as parents before the beginning of the academic year to enable them to cope with the educational programme and to fill the gap that exists between school and college. In the first semester, an internal assessment test is conducted and the students are evaluated. Weak students are given special attention and remedial coaching in various subjects. Peer team help is used where bright students help the slow learners. The class is divided into various groups and combine study within the campus after and before

college hours is promoted. Motivational classes are conducted for students with the help of external faculty.

2.2.2 How does the institution identify slow and advanced learners? Give details on the strategies adopted for facilitating slow and advanced learners.

The slow and advanced learners are identified through the class tests, term tests and from classroom responses. Remedial classes are designed to bring up students who are lagging behind the level of achievement attained by their peers.

- Some students come from schools of poor quality and do not have adequate competency especially in the English language.
- There are deficiencies in their education which contribute to lack of knowledge in core subject.
- Students also have learning disorders.
- Many students come from economically backward families. There are
 also problems of alcoholic addiction among fathers. Many of the
 students are first generation learners and their lack a supportive
 atmosphere at home. Hence a large number of students need to be
 motivated in their studies.

Slow learners are given counselling session to find out the reason for their backwardness and remedial measures are given in consultation with parents through regular follow-up programmes. The teachers will introduce challenging areas of study. Opportunities are given to attend competitive tests. When new areas in the subject of study are introduced, students are encouraged to use the library and web facilities. As awards there are proficiency prizes and endowment prizes. Gold medals are given to rank holders during the meeting on the first day of the classes, thereby encouraging the new comers.

2.2.3 Does the institution have a provision for tutorials for the students? If yes, give details.

In this institution the class teacher plays the role of a tutor. Each class has an assigned tutor who maintains the student's profile and monitors the progress. The tutor is also responsible for the 'open houses' with parents. Each teacher who handles the topic finds out the slow learners and puts forth remedial measures like questioning, tests during the morning hours, giving peer help by selecting the peer-helper and monitoring them from time to time.

Remedial teaching is done after college hours. The instruction is the same as in the main stream. As the student strength is small and the teacher can respond to the unique needs of each student.

2.2.4 Is there a provision for mentoring of students or any similar process? If yes, give details.

Every Monday second hour is allotted for mentoring. Mentors have personal interaction with students and help them in academic and personal progress. The mentors have a diary in which the progress of students is noted down.

These mentor teachers develop a positive relationship with students. They help the students to develop self-esteem that will help them in stressful and frustrating situations. They also help to develop leadership qualities and nurture a relationship that respects the students self respect and dignity to enhance success in academic activities and life.

2.2.5 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students?

The class in-charge makes an appeal to the classmates to help the disadvantaged students. Usually there will be one or two students in this category, whom we will help both physically and mentally in every way. The management provides hostel facilities to these students if they need it. Special attention is also given by the non-teaching staff and the examination co-ordinator, in conformity with the guidelines provided by the university,

in providing extra time and convenient place for such candidates. Scribes are also provided if necessary.

2.3 Teaching -Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the institution plan and organize the teaching-learning and evaluation Schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan and evaluation blue print, etc.)

Placing students at the center of teaching- learning environment requires the teachers to have a different attitude and a new way of relating to students. Effective teachers are comfortable with both cognitive and affective dimensions of teaching. Achieving genuine relationships means being available to students, being glad to be in the classroom with them, sharing with them what is happening that is relevant and interesting, and finding time for meaningful activities.

Teaching is enabling the students to do their best by helping them to know their capacities. Teaching is a daily exercise which demands courage and honesty. It is vital to view the process of teaching as a developmental journey and to share the belief that teachers are always in process of becoming in their profession. In this way, teachers become more approachable, and the negative attitudes decline. The students are able to accept their teachers. The making of a teacher should not be a one-time event, but an ongoing process that spans the entire career. Focusing on students, building their capabilities and examining the practice can transform teaching as well as learning. The evolving nature of becoming a teacher definitely makes the journey wise, meaningful and enjoyable.

An academic calendar is prepared by the college every year in accordance with the university calendar. A year plan is prepared by each department including curricular and extracurricular activities of that academic year. Faculties in various disciplines work out time bound teaching programmes to make it feasible within the academic curriculum. The time table is prepared with a view to cater to the needs of students and also by avoiding repetition of topics.

The progress of students is analyzed with the help of test papers (conducted after each module), assignments and seminar presentations. Class teachers record the periodical progress of the students in teacher's diary. The evaluation of blue print includes class tests, term tests, re-tests, progress report, seminars, projects, assignments and teacher feedback.

Teachers constantly give feedback to students on their learning. The way the teachers respond when students contribute to lectures, seminars and assignments give them insights about the progress of their learning. Asking students to summarize a lecture or to compare notes or answers with the person sitting next to them are simple ways of offering some insight into their level of understanding. Feedback should be an ongoing process. To be effective, students need to receive feedback in time and to make use of it. Students gain useful feedback from each other and through reflecting on their own learning. Providing opportunities for peer and self-assessment ensures that it is not something that happens at the end of a course, but an ongoing part of the learning process.

2.3.2 What are the various teaching-learning methods (lecture method, interactive method, project-based learning, computer-assisted learning, experiential learning, seminars and others) used by the teachers? Give details.

Teachers have diversified the teaching methods from teacher oriented to more learner-oriented activities where group work and team learning play a major role. There is corrective and creative interaction between the faculty and students. Experimentation, observation, group discussion, case study, practical work, projects and dissertations strengthen qualities of communication, research and professional competence. Every method used in teaching-learning process is supplement with the use of IT and e-learning. The experience of the on the job training at industrial units and work places evaluates the functional success of teaching-learning and gives a performance appraisal of teachers and learners. Field trips, visit to industrial units, reputed research labs, major business establishments etc, are conducted.

Learning is undoubtedly more effective through visual interactive materials. Though traditional textbook continues to be a major educational resource, the videos are fast becoming an alternative learning tool. Education does not mean learning only core subjects prescribed for the programme. Along with the subjects the pedagogic and home environment should offer facilities that help learning life lessons too-like how to deal with others, how to develop positive thinking and leadership qualities.

2.3.3 How learning is made student-centric? What are the institutional strategies which contribute to acquisition of life skills, knowledge management skills and lifelong learning?

Learning is made student-centric by introducing the relevant training such as soft skill development, interview techniques and stress/time management. Students are provided with opportunities to take up leadership in organizing seminars, quiz programmes, workshops and event management. students are trained in life skills and problem solving behaviors through seminars, workshops, group tasks in order to manage personal affairs appropriately and responsibly. In moral and mentoring classes teachers share experiential knowledge to handle problems and questions commonly encountered in daily life. Depending on societal norms and community expectations our students are trained through the units like NCC, NSS and Women's Study Cell. Career Guidance and Placement Cell are conducting programmes on personality development and Career Orientation and our students are securing placements in Multinational companies. The Certificate Course in Pain and Palliative Care conducted by NSS unit in collaboration with Anwar Hospital, Aluva is the most useful one for women of today.

2.3.4 How does the institution ensure that the students have effective learning experiences? (Use of modern teaching aids and tools like computers, audiovisual, multi-media, ICT, CAL, Internet and other information/materials)

To make learning effective, computers, audio-visual and multi-media, ICT, CAL and Internet are used regularly. Power-point presentations, film-shows,

facilities of language lab etc. are employed to give an effective learning experience for the students. Broadband facility is provided for all departments. English classes for all UG students are taught with the help of ICT. The Research Cell of our college provides a platform for multi-disciplinary power point presentation thereby giving exposure to various areas of knowledge. The library week celebration helps in inculcating reading habits among students and staff.

2.3.5 How do the students and faculty keep pace with the recent developments in the various subjects?

Teachers as well as students take part in seminars, workshops, camps, site visits and refresher courses in order to update their knowledge. Various departments of the college have organized seminars and conferences to keep pace with the growing frontiers of knowledge. Inter-disciplinary seminars have been conducted with the aim of promoting respect and esteem for all areas of knowledge. New books and journals are purchased every year for updating knowledge. The internet facility enables every learner in the college to refresh her knowledge. Faculty with foreign exposure brings innovative ideas to the campus. The contact with various organizations, industrial and commercial institutes familiarize us with the new inventions in different fields. Software updating and purchase of new computers help a lot to keep pace with the changes in educational technology.

- 2.3.6 Are there departmental libraries for the use of faculty and students? If yes, how effectively are they used for the enhancement of teaching and learning? The departments with postgraduate programmes are in the process of improving their existing library facilities. It helps both teachers and students for immediate reference. Circulation system is also there in certain departments. Apart from books there is also a collection of multi-media materials in the departments.
- 2.3.7 Has the institution introduced evaluation of the teachers by students? If yes, how is the feedback analyzed and implemented for the improvement of teaching?

Feedback mechanism is effectively employed in improving teaching. Feedback forms are prepared by the faculty and the students are asked to fill in the details. Students freely express their views on the inadequacies and the improvements needed. Teachers analyze the feedback of students and identify the areas for improvement.

Teacher Quality

- 2.4.1 How are the members of the faculty selected? Does the college have the required number of qualified and competent teachers to handle all the courses? If not, how does the institution cope with the requirements?
 - The members of the faculty are selected based on the University, Government and UGC norms. The vacancies are advertised in all editions of one National English daily and two Malayalam dailies having wide circulation. The selection committee consisting of the Principal, General Manger, Government Nominee, Subject Expert and the Department Head selects the candidates on the basis of the rank list prepared on merit basis and also a personal interview. All the sanctioned posts are filled immediately with highly qualified teachers. At present there are 47 permanent faculty members; out of this 16 have Ph.D. and 13 have M. Phil as the highest qualification. A few vacancies in certain departments, where the concurrence from the government is awaited, temporary teachers with adequate qualification are appointed and financed by the management. Qualified and competent teachers handle all the self-financing courses.
- 2.4.2 How does the college appoint additional faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas of study (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? How many such appointments were made during the last three years?
 - The additional faculty members are appointed on the basis of advertisement in the newspapers and interview. The college interview board consisting of the Principal, the Manager, HOD, and Superintendent selects the qualified teachers. Thirteen appointments were made for the last three years.

2.4.3 What efforts are made by the management for professional development of the faculty? (eg: research grants, study leave, deputation to national/ international conferences/ seminars, training programmes, organizing national/ international conferences etc)? How many faculties have availed these facilities during the last three years?

The professional development of the faculty is ensured in various methods. 100% computer literacy of the faculty is attained and all the faculty members by themselves are uploading the internal assessment marks to the university in the website. The Faculty has full freedom to develop themselves. They can apply for any research grants, can undertake study leave and can go on deputation for national and international conferences and training programmes. All the departments are requested to conduct at least one seminar, workshop or conference once in every two years. All the departments have conducted seminars and faculty members have attended the same.

- 2.4.5 How often does the institution organize training programmes for the faculty in the use of?
 - a) Computers

The entire teaching faculty and the administrative staff have been were given training in the competent use of computers.

b) Internet

With the competency in the usage of computers the faculties have learned to use the internet also.

c) Audio Visual Aids

When audio visual aids are purchased, training in its usage in ensured from the suppliers themselves.

d) Computer-Aided Packages

The faculty members enter the internal assessment marks of the students in the university website with the help of software developed by the M.G. University.

e) Material development for CAL, multi-media etc.

Faculty members who are in the board of studies have developed materials for learning.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reform

Internal examinations are conducted as per the university norms. They are valued as per the GPA grading system. External examinations are conducted by the university and the faculty members regularly undertake the evaluation work.

2.5.1 How are the evaluation methods communicated to the students and other institutional members?

An orientation programme is conducted for the first year students and their parents in the beginning of the academic year. Since most of the parents are not well educated information regarding evaluation methods and time of evaluation are made known to them. Evaluation and internal assessment methods are explained to them. University notifications are circulated in the departments and are displayed for the students on the notice board. The evaluation methods are clearly given in the college calendar distributed to students. The faculty of the department and the class-in-charge will explain these to the students and clarify their doubts regarding evaluation methods. Question banks are complied to familiarize the students with the examination mode.

The internal assessment co-ordinator bridges the gap between the university and the college community. The college council arranges the examination as per the university notifications which are also informed to the faculty members. The dates of the internal tests are notified in the handbook.

Announcements through the public address system and display of the examination schedule on the notice boards are made. The examination dates are also read out in each class.

2.5.2 How does the institution monitor the progress of the students and communicate it to the students and their parents?

The progress of the students is monitored using periodic tests, seminars and assignments. After each term, a progress report is prepared with relevant remarks and parents are invited for open house sessions. During this session, a firsthand knowledge regarding the student's economic and social condition is collected. This enables a teacher in helping the student overcome difficulties in the learning process. The students are also informed of their progress at the time of return of the valued answer scripts. Class-in-charge in their discussions with students reminds them of their progress in studies. An annual PTA meeting is conducted in which constructive suggestions are welcomed.

2.5.3 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances regarding evaluation?

Firstly the complaints regarding evaluation are brought to the notice of the concerned teacher. If the student is not satisfied, the head of the department deals with the matter and usually settles the issue. If the student is not satisfied still, she can bring it to the notice of the Principal. But this has not happened in the college so far. A retest is conducted if any student had been sick or had to participate in sports events or cultural and art festivals.

2.5.4 What are the major evaluation reforms initiated by the institution/affiliating University? How does the institution ensure effective implementation of these reforms?

The major evaluation system introduced by the university includes the grading of answer scripts, assignments and seminars. On the introduction of the grading system faculty representatives underwent a two day workshop. They in turn explained to the rest of the faculty how the grading system is

done. The system of internal assessment along with university exam has undergone reforms. There is centralized valuation camp for paper valuation. A university code is assigned to each teacher to ensure transparency in evaluation. The institute strictly follows the mode of evaluation proposed by the university. Internal assessment forms are manually prepared with care firstly by the subject teacher. The forms are rechecked by the class-in-charge and verified by the students. The HOD and the Principal countersign the data which is then uploaded in the university exam portal.

2.6 Best Practices in Teaching -Learning Process

Slow learners are identified and they are encouraged by the teachers to do combined peer study. Teachers have diversified the teaching methods from teacher oriented to more learner-oriented activities where group work and team learning play a major role. There is corrective and creative interaction between the faculty and students. Experimentation, observation, group discussion, case study, practical work, projects and dissertations help in improving qualities of communication, research and professional competence.

Every method used in teaching-learning process is supplemented with the use of IT and E-learning.

The experience of the on the job training at industrial units and work places evaluates the functional success of teaching-learning and gives a performance appraisal of teachers and learners.

Field trips, visit to industrial units, reputed research labs, major business establishments etc, are conducted.

- 2.6.1 Detail any significant innovations in teaching/learning/evaluation introduced by the institution?
 - 100% computer literacy of the faculty is attained and all the faculty members by themselves are uploading the internal assessment marks to the university website. Each department is provided with atleast two computers and with a printer which are used intensively.

- More audio visual aids are included in various departments to make the teaching effective. Learning is undoubtedly more effective through visual interactive materials. Though traditional textbook continues to be a major educational resource, the videos and LCD's are fast becoming an alternative learning tool.
- Moral and spiritual support is given to teachers, students and nonteaching staff by conducting seminars, workshops and interactive sessions in collaboration with the Xavier Board of Higher Education and AICUF.
- The rapport established between the management and the teaching faculty enhances teaching. Similarly the cordial atmosphere in the college from the part of the management encourages the students to enjoy freedom and comfort for smooth learning.

For Re-accreditation:

- 1. What were the evaluative observations made under Teaching-Learning and Evaluation in the previous assessment report and how have they been acted upon?
 - The present system of grading is found to be more acceptable to the students. The students seem to score better under the system. Most of the students are found to be computer literate and those who are not, are figured out and asked to undergo a Computer Certificate Course in the College itself. Those students who have a Computer at home are encouraged to make power point presentations with the help of their system and others make use of the systems available in the home departments. The workload of the faculty is found to have increased as the numbers of test papers, seminars, assignments and external evaluation have doubled in relation to the annual system of examination which the teachers have accepted with grace.
- 2. What are the other quality sustenance and enhancement measures undertaken by the institution since the previous Assessment and Accreditation with regard to Teaching-Learning and Evaluation?

Improvements in infrastructural facilities were remarkable during the academic years following last accreditation. The construction of the fourth storey in the St. Joseph's Block has been completed. The safety of the human life is very important factor and as per the building regulations of the Municipality a fire alarm, control and extinguishing system has been installed. In the Jesus block the office was refurbished according to the present needs. Arrangement of class rooms was done in the functional manner. The PG departments have their own seminar halls with LCD's.

Infrastructure facilities like the generator, lift, tarring of the road, rain water harvesting and vermin compost have been installed for the convenience of the stake holders. For convenient and safe transportation the college has introduced two bus services along the routes where the traffic of the students are heavy. The canteen which is clean, modern, spacious and comfortable is the meeting ground where the students flock to enjoy their snacks and involve themselves in debates and arguments. The open ground around the basket ball and volleyball courts have comfortable shaded areas where again the students gather themselves to enjoy the blissful surroundings. Looking forward to the future, application is submitted to the University for demand oriented PG courses in Mathematics, Economics, Communicative English and Malayalam and UG courses, Sociology, Hindi, B.Com. with Computer Application and Business Communication with Journalism.

The grading system of evaluation introduced by the University is followed for all internal evaluation. Feed-back regarding teaching learning is accepted from the students at the end of each semester and remedial measures are under taken.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Is there a Research Committee to facilitate and monitor research activity? If yes, give details on its activities, major decisions taken (during last year) and composition of the Committee.

There is a Research Cell which facilitates research activities consisting of:

Co-ordinator Dr. Vimala, Dept. of Commerce

Members Dr. Ansa alphonsa Antony Dept. of Statistics

Dr. Raji Joseph Dept. of Commerce

Research Cell daily checks the websites of major research facilitating bodies like UGC, Human Resource Development Board, SPICES BOARD, IMRB, RBI, AICTE, and UNESCO etc., and discuss them with student leaders and faculty and encourage every one to start research projects. The major decision taken in the last year is to present research papers of different disciplines continuously and give encouragement to students to engage in research. A few research sessions are also conducted.

3.1.2 How does the institution promote faculty participation in research? (providing seed money, research grants, leave, other facilities)

The management always expresses its full and whole hearted support to the teachers to engage themselves in research activities, by sanctioning leave, adjusting work-load, extending laboratory facilities, equipping the library with books and journals as per the request, giving technical assistance, and moral support. Teachers are encouraged to avail FIP to carry on research work. To attend seminars, workshops and conferences every support is given. Teachers are encouraged to take up major and minor projects funded by UGC.

3.1.3. Does the institutional budget have a provision for research and development? If yes, give details

The institution helps the faculty to take up research programmes and help them to do the paper work with the assistance of the administrative staff. When the research cell comes to know of various research programmes, it communicates the same to the faculty through the college council. Separate funds are not allocated in the budget of the management for research and

development. The funds for research and developments are usually sort from outside agencies and other funding organizations.

- 3.1.4 Does the institution promote participation of students in research activities? If yes, give details.
 - Field Work for Economic students on Eradication of Polio.
 - Field work for Commerce students on "A survey on health issues at Choornikkara Panchayat".
 - Field work for Botany students regarding the collection and development of Herbarium.
 - On-job-training for all fifth semester students of Communicative English.
 - On job training of all fifth semester students of Zoology (Vocational).
 - Dissertation for all PG students.
 - Projects for all 6th Semester students of the undergraduate level.
 - PG students of Physics department are making use of facilities of the research labs in the department of Physics CUSAT, neighbouring colleges and institutions like FACT for their desertion. This will create an interest towards research activities.
- 3.1.5 What are the major research facilities developed on the campus?

The Library has research oriented books. 178 Journals on all subjects are subscribed for. Computer and internet facilities for staff and students are provided in each department.

In the science departments modern and requisite equipment have been installed. The museum of the zoology department is refurbished and modernized. A vermin-composite pit is developed for managing waste generated in the campus. 200KV generator for the use of the college is installed.

A high vacuum coating unit, distillation unit, microbalance, magnetic stirrer etc are installed in the Department of Physics for promoting research in Material Science.

3.1.6 Give details of the initiatives taken by the institution for collaborative research (with national/ foreign Universities/ Research/Scientific organizations/ Industries/ NGOs)

In the council and staff meetings the details regarding the research works called for by various agencies are made known to the faculty members. The faculty members are encouraged to undertake the same.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities? (NSS, NCC, YRC and other NGOs)

NSS unit of the college has won the best unit award, best co-coordinator award, the best volunteer award, continuously for the past 5 years, and the best supporting principal award in the last year.

The University provides the students grace marks when they participate in NSS activities. Grace marks are also provided during the admission process for higher studies.

The institute supports and encourages the NSS unit to conduct 10 day's major camp and two day's minicamp to which help the students to understand and study the effects of community living. The NSS volunteers also participate in rallies which help them to have an understanding of the current issues faced by the society such as Mullaperiyar issue. The students conduct surveys and make field studies and prepare study reports. Blood donation, visiting old age homes, adoption of village, providing facilities to the village, building homes for the homeless are some of the social service undertaken by the NSS regularly. Students are indeed very much interested and are attracted in large numbers to these programmes as they feel that they have very good chance for personality development, exchange of culture, creation of the ability to establish healthy relationships, getting social awareness etc. These are some of the chances for interacting and involving in social outreach programmes.

3.4.2 What are the outreach programmes organized by the institution? How are they integrated with the academic curricula?

All the departments conduct study tours for the final year students and they are asked to present feed backs in the class. These study tours give them first hand information on the practical aspects of the subjects. Visits to factories, collection of specimens, visiting planetarium, museums, art galleries, interacting with the different cultures, enjoying the food in the neighboring states, and visiting libraries of other institutes give them more details regarding the practical aspects of their study.

Visits to old age homes and mentally retarded schools and sharing the experiences also enrich the girls to feel with the disabled society.

Twice in a year Blood donation camp is conducted in collaboration with IMA which shows them the nobility of the act. Ms. Sheena Xavier, the teacher donor is held in high esteem and is a role model. Her blood group is AB negative. Training programmes are conducted in Pain and Palliative care in collaboration with the neighbouring hospitals. The red – ribbon club in the college gives awareness programmes on Aids and conducts rallies to propagate anti-AIDS movement.

Along with Kerala Action Force, programmes in tailoring, cookery and soap making for local women and widows are conducted to create awareness for the marginalized among our students. Women's Day is celebrated in the class which throws light on the empowerment programmes of the Government.

Seminars and workshops are conducted so as to give awareness regarding the legal issues, traffic rules and other social issues.

Important days such as World Aids Day, Republic Day, Independence Day, Teacher's Day, World Environmental Day, Hiroshima Day, Kerala Day etc are celebrated by participating in the various programmes arranged by the Municipality.

A certificate course in Human rights and duties is conducted to give the awareness about our duties and responsibilities as human beings. The Women's study Cell conducts classes for soap making, cookery and tailoring which empower the economically weak and deprived women of the adopted village. The Career Guidance cell helps the needy and those

desiring to take up a job after their course by inviting companies for placements. The project of Home for the poor taken by NSS and PTA provide asylums for many poor people in the locality.

Tailoring, Yoga, Music and counseling classes by RELAX and OSAX of the college empower women with physical and mental health and also give the opportunity to earn their livelihood.

3.4.3 How does the institution promote college-neighborhood network in which students acquire attitude for service and training, contributive to community development?

The college has adopted Madhavapuram Village. Here cleanliness programmes, programmes on the awareness of the destructiveness of alcohol for negativism of liquor and drugs, AIDS awareness programmes, health related lectures are conducted in order to help the backward communities in the village. The widows and economically deprived women are motivated to become self sufficient.

The college accepts all the norms provided by the University and encourages the students to take up the various programmes initiated. The Pain and Palliative programme of the Anwar Hospital, Aluva is promoted by the college. NGO's like Kerala Action Force have close collaboration.

of the benefits to the residents. Surveys and field studies are made and measures taken to rectify the shortcomings.

The pain and palliative club visits the old age homes around its suburbs giving relief and spreading happiness to the aged.

Twice in a year Blood donation camp is conducted in collaboration with IMA. IMA gives lectures which show the nobility of the act. Ms. Sheena Xavier, the teacher donor is held in high esteem and is a role model. Her blood group is AB negative. The red-ribbon club in the college is giving awareness programmes on Aids and conducting rallies to propagate anti-aids movement. The NSS initiated this practice which was considered to be exemplary. But the public and NGO's in an around Aluva were highly responsive. This was then taken up and continued by the different sectors of the College.

Till date 8 houses have been built for the needy and homeless. . Responses from the public to this have been very encouraging and more of them are coming forward to seek help to complete the construction of their incomplete houses. Four such houses were completed with the help of the college.

The research output of the faculty has increased considerably as their exposure to various interdisciplinary programmes have widened. Every Semester the Research Cell conducts an inter- disciplinary presentation of research papers for both PG and UG students.

The science departments have well equipped updated laboratories. The college is proud of its collection of books in its partly digitalized and well furnished library. Well furnished modern canteen is the place where the students relax and enjoy their meals and snacks. Photostat machines are placed in vantage points. Safe, clean and well ventilated rooms are provided in the hostel. An auditorium supported by a 125KV generator, podium, high lumens LCD and sound system is very useful for conducting all curricular and co-curricular programmes. Mother Redempta Seminar Hall is utilized by all the departments for all the State and National Seminars.

NCC, NSS, Women's cell, Nature club, Students council and Counselling are provided with rooms for carrying out their works.

The health club with well furnished health oriented equipments is the attraction especially for the sports students and hostellers.

There are standard Volleyball and Basketball courts for various tournaments. A Kabaddi field is also there.

There is a prayer room For the Jesus Youth and AICUF members.

The Sargavedi club in collaboration with Malayala Manorama, Mathrubhoomi and Kerala Kaumadhi newspapers provide media oriented programmes.

Being a Women's College good facilities are provided for the purpose. The rest and rest rooms are provided with vending sanitary napkin units with disposable facilities. Cubicles are provided in the common room where the students will have privacy for learning and having their meals.

4.1.5 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is optimally utilized?

The Principal has a diary in which the uses of the auditorium and seminar hall are listed and if outsiders ask for the utilization of the same it is granted to them free of cost. The auditorium is used by the neighbouring educational institutes for conducting different seminars. The medical camps and the award giving ceremonies and various functions for the public are held in the auditorium. The college canteen facilities are utilized for

marriage functions of poor girls. It is used for Congregational purposes. The basketball and volleyball court is used by public teams from outside the campus during holidays.

4.1.6 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of the differently-abled students?

The differently-abled students are given admission in the hostel. The differently abled students seek admission mainly in English and Malayalam classes and these departments are in the ground floor. There is the lift facility in St. Joseph's block which is a great help to these students. Those students who seek admission in the hostel are given ground floor rooms. The canteen, rest room, library, seminar hall, prayer room, counselling room, office room consisting of the administration section are all in the ground floor which is easily accessible.

4.2.2 How does the institution ensure optimal utilization of budget allocated for various activities?

The infrastructure needs to be maintained on a regular basis. The need for maintenance is brought to the notice of the committee for maintenance and the college council. The Principal conveys this to the management which carries out the work.

4.2.3 Does the institution appoint staff for maintenance and repair? If not, how are the infrastructure facilities, services and equipment maintained?

The management has appointed ten staff members on a regular basis for maintenance and repair activities. Further technical maintenance is supplemented by technical staff employed on daily wages.

4.3 Library as a Learning Resource

4.3.1 Does the library have a Library Advisory Committee? What are its major responsibilities?

The library has a Library Advisory Committee. Ms. Lincy Joseph, Head of the Department of English is the head of the committee. The major responsibilities of this committee is co-ordinating the library activities. The major activity of the library is the conduct of the "Library week". Book shows, book talks and the programmes of the functioning of the library are carried out to increase reading habits. Maintaining the discipline, evaluating the effective functioning of the library periodically and addressing the students complaints are also monitored by the committee. The purchase of new books and journals are made under the direction of the library committee and the college council. The needs of the staffs and students are taken into consideration before decisions are taken.

4.3.2 How does the library ensure access, use and security of materials?

The Library functions from 8.30 am to 4.30pm on every working day. The periodicals and newspapers section is open during the working time and students spent their time in light reading. The reference section is also open to the students during the working time. The stack room is open for the students and staff from 9.30 to 3.30, books is issued regularly every week, on different days for different classes. For the PG Students and Staff there are no such restrictions. The materials in the library are safe as the users are strictly instructed to take care of the books and journals. They are also

instructed to use the facilities in a mature way and to be mindful of the future users and not to damage any books or journal.

4.3.3 What are the various support facilities available in the library? (computers, internet, band width, reprographic facilities etc.)

The support facilities in the library are

- 4.3.4 How does the library ensure purchase and use of current titles, important journals and other reading materials? Specify the amount spent on new books and journals during the last five years.

The purchase of the new books and journals are made through the library committee and the college council. The UGC fund is very diligently used by all the departments. About 6.5 lakhs has been spend for a last 5 years for the purchase. The dailies in Malayalam are sponsored by well wishers. New arrivals of books and magazines are well displayed to attract the attention of the readers.

4.3.5 Give details on the access of the on-line and Internet services in the library to the students and faculty? (hours, frequency of use, subscriptions, licensed software etc..).

The library functions from 8.30am to 4.30pm. Free broadband Internet and data search are available to all staff and students within the working hours. The college has complete licensed versions of Microsoft Windows XP, Windows 7, Vista, Microsoft Office, Visual Studio 6.0, Tally 9.0.

4.3.6 Are the library services computerized? If yes, to what extent?

The library services are fully computerized. Digital Repository Solution is used for preserving the digital assets like eBooks, Teaching Notes, Project Reports, Past year Question Papers, Video Courseware, Journals, e-Thesis, etc. of St. Xavier's College. We are proposing the implementation of Dspace Digital Repository.

4.3.7 Does the institution make use of INFLIBNET / DELNET/IUC facilities? If yes, give details.

The college has installed INFLIBNET facility in the Library.

4.3.8 What initiatives are taken by the library staff to enrich the faculty and students with its latest acquisitions?

New additions are displayed on the notice board.

4.3.9 Does the library have interlibrary borrowing facility? If yes, give details of the facility

The library does not have interlibrary borrowing facility but outsiders like bank employees, and the public in an around Aluva can borrow the books by making a deposit which is returned on returning the books.

4.3.10 What are the special facilities offered by the library to the visually- and physically- challenged persons?

The physically challenged students are helped by their class mates in selecting books. The audio facilities available is of great help to blind students.

4.3.11 List the infrastructural development of the library over the last two years.

Safety door with Proximity Card System is introduced. It is a method to assess the students' time spent in the library, references made and the total details or the use of library. Bar coding system is introduced for borrowing and returning. For better stacking one more room is built. The library is provided with computers fitted with internet facilities. A Photostat machine is installed.

4.3.12 What other information services are provided by the library to its users?

The recent arrivals of books and journals are displayed in a special counter. The Librarian gives personal attention to the required needs of the users as per their requests.

4.4 ICT as Learning Resources

4.4.1 Does the Institution have up-to-date computer facility? If yes, give details on the available hardware and software (No. of computers, computer-students ratio, stand alone facility, LAN facility, configuration, software)

A computer centre with 45 desktops connected with LAN and Internet. An add-on course on Computer Applications is conducted with 18 computers. The Tally course is conducted with 8 computers. The English Language Lab has 17 computers for language learning. Every department is provided with a computer, printer and scanner with broadband connection. The PG departments have a LCD with smart class room facility.

4.4.2 Is there a central computing facility? If yes, how is it utilized for staff to students?

A computer centre with central computing facility with 45 desktops with LAN connection is utilized fully for providing computer literacy to students. Various courses are offered to the students of the college under the auspices of the computer centre. The staff and students who do not have computers at home use the systems available in the computer lab.

4.4.3 How are the faculty facilitated to prepare computer-aided teaching/learning materials? What are the facilities available in the college for such efforts?

Teachers when they undergo seminars and workshops come to know of the recent trends in technology aided teaching and learning. They will disseminate the information to the Principal who presents it to the college council and during the staff meeting a demo class of the same is held. The college is fully equipped as detailed above for computer-aided teaching and learning.

4.4.4 Does the Institution have a website? How frequently is it updated? Give details.

The website of the college is stxaviersaluva.ac.in and it is updated at frequent intervals. Ms. Leena Deenja of the Physics department is incharge of website updating.

4.4.5 How often does the institution plan and upgrade its computer systems? What is the provision made in the annual budget for update, deployment and maintenance of the computers in the institution?

The computer systems are upgraded as per the need. For the maintenance of the computer system about Rs.3 lakhs per annum is spent. For updating the computers between 5 lakhs to 10 lakhs have been spend every year over the last five years.

4.4.6 How are the computers and their accessories maintained? (AMC etc.)

A person is appointed on a regular basis for maintenance of all electronic gadgets. Outside help of technicians is utilized on a need basis.

4.5 Other Facilities

- 4.5.1 Give details of the following facilities:
 - a) Capacity of the hostels (to be given separately for boys and Girls)

The hostel has a capacity to accommodate 250 students. 28 sports students are also accommodated in the hostel.

The students's hostel in the college is now occupied by 157 girls. Most of the students are day scholars and they come from the rural areas of Aluva.

b) Rooms in the hostel (to be given separately for boys and Girls)

Rooms in the hostel are on a sharing basis and the students are grouped as UG and PG and accommodated as such.

c) Recreational facilities

There is a common room for the girls to relax and to have their social get together. The hostel environment is peaceful and quiet. In the evenings one can enjoy a beautiful view of the river periyar from the hostel.

d) Sports and Games (Indoor and Outdoor) facilities

The Basketball and Volleyball courts are well maintained. The walkway is used by the students for a stroll in the evening.

e) Health and Hygiene (Health Care centre, Ambulance, Nurse, Qualified Doctor) (full time/ part time etc.)

There is a health club with all its gadgets which are utilized by the students. The sports students use it for their exercise. The college is surrounded by very good private hospitals where the management has built a very good relationship with the doctors. The doctors are always obliging to attend emergencies. Canteens and hostels are maintained hygienically.

4.5.2 How does the institution ensure participation of women in intra-and interinstitutional sports competitions and cultural activities?

Being women's college there is encouragement for the participation of women in all competitions and cultural activities. Students actively participate in sports and cultural activities. The achievements listed already bear evidence for the outstanding achievements of our students. The sports students have won laurels at all levels that are University, State and National. The college could secure fourth place in M.G University Youth Festival in the year 2010-11.

4.5.3 Give details of the common facilities available with the Institution (Staff room, day care centre, common room for students, rest rooms, health centre, vehicle parking, guest house, Canteen, telephone, internet cafe, transport, drinking water etc.)

All the departments of the College are having well furnished staff rooms with individual seating arrangements, phone connection, computers, and internet facilities. There are two Common rooms for the girls, to rest, recreate and for personal and group study. A Health Club if functioning with all modern equipments for physical fitness. Apart from that First Aid facilities are provided in all the departments. The College has two guest rooms in the Jesus Block where the important personalities are accommodated. The Canteen in the ground floor of St. Joseph's Block is well furnished and can accommodate more than 100 students at a time. It has got the status of 4 Star hotel and the students enjoy. The drinking water facilities are installed in alternate floors and indeed it is a great comfort to refresh the students. Two buses are at the service of the students from distant places. All the blocks including administrative block are connected with intercom facilities and we have 40 phone connections. Xaverian Kid's Care is functioning to facilitate the faculty members to be at ease by taking care of their kids safely while the mother's are engaged in teaching and other activities.

4.6 Best Practices in Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.6.1 What innovations/best practices in 'Infrastructure and Learning Resources' are in vogue or adopted/adapted by the institution?

The faculty who are 100 percent computer literate, ascertain at the time of admission, the students who are not computer literate. The faculty encourages and motivates them to become computer literate which is usually accepted by the students.

Since mobile phone cannot be used in the campus, two coin box phone booths are provided for the students. For interdepartmental instant communication there is the mobile under the CUG System and intercom.

The internet facility is open from 9.30 am till 4.30 pm. As several young teachers are recruited recently, the need for a day care centre is felt. So the Xaverian Kid's Centre is established with the UGC aid. A hygienic and very comfortable canteen is available in the campus. The college environment is very conducive and promotes socializing of the students and the stake holders.

For Re-accreditation:

1. What were the evaluative observations made under Infrastructure and Learning Resources in the previous assessment report and how have they been acted upon?

The evaluative observance made was to enhance total literacy of non-teaching staff and computer literacy for students. For the computer literacy of the students, the departments of Physics and Commerce have begun add-on courses on Computer application, E-Banking, Security analysis, Tally, etc., and all the non teaching staff members are given training in computer usage. All the sections in the administrative office are provided with computers and all the office works are done using computer programmes and softwares. Apart from this the Computer Centre is open to all to update their computer skills.

2. What are the other quality sustenance and enhancement measures undertaken by the institution since the previous Assessment and Accreditation with regard to Infrastructure and Learning Resources?

The laboratory and library facilities were upgraded creating a conducive environment for research and learning. New laboratory was set up, for the Microbiology department. A language lab has been set up with audio and video facilities for the English department. A new computer lab is created for the Physics department. The staff room facilities of all departments were modified and strengthened. Electrical, re-wiring and cabling was done and a transformer was setup. Class rooms were re-furnished with better lighting arrangements and fans. Drinking water facility has been set up in alternative floors. Reprographic facilities are also introduced. A rest room and waiting room were also set up. The library facilities have been enhanced by automation; reprographic and internet facilities are also provided. The college library committee looks into matters like annual purchase and other enhancements. The computer centre was modified by the introduction of more computers and LAN facility. Sports and research facilities of the college were improved. A new wing is added to the existing structure and a lift system is introduced in St. Joseph's Block and a generator of 1200 Watt started to function in order to rectify the shortage in electricity.

5.1.2 What are the efforts made by the Institution to minimize the dropout rate and facilitate the students to complete the course?

In spite of the large number of students from marginalized section of society, the dropout rate is very low about less than 3 percent. The M.G. University has introduced central admission system from the academic year 2011. The students are given counselling as to the need to get themselves educated and be financially independent by securing a career.

5.1.3 On an average, what percentage of the students progress to further studies and for employment? Give details for the last two years. (UG to PG to Ph.D and /or to employment)

In the Arts section about 40% of the students are going for higher studies namely M.A, MBA, LLB, IAS etc.

In the science section about 35% of the students go for higher studies namely M.Sc and MCA. After graduation about 25 % seek employment in the public and private sectors.

In the Commerce section about 80% go for higher studies – M.Com, MBA, IAS, CA, CS, ICWA, ICFAI, Bank test etc

The remaining 20% usually seek employment in the private sector.

5.1.4 How does the institution facilitate the placement of its outgoing students? What proportion of the graduating students have been employed? (average of last five years)

The Career Guidance and Placement Cell empower students by mentoring, motivating and guiding them to realize their career aspirations. As per the data most of the students go in for higher studies or get employed. Many industrial and IT firms are invited by the institute to conduct selection programmes and thus encourage campus interview programmes. Through this many of our students get placements. Every year the Communicative English students in large number are place in various prestigious organizations and firms through campus selection programmes.

5.1.5 How does the institution facilitate and support students for appearing and qualifying in various competitive examinations? Give details on the number of students coached, appeared and qualified in various competitive examinations (Average of last five years) (UGC-CSIR-NET, SLET, GATE, CAT, GRE, TOFEL, GMAT, Civil Services- IAS,IPS,IFS, Central/State services etc.)

The Department of Commerce has been giving training to the candidates to appear for competitive examinations. Within two years they have trained fifty students and 10 of them qualified UGC-CSIR-NET. The English Department conducted two crash courses in UGC training and two students have qualified their NET examination. The staff members of all the departments support and guide the students in getting learning materials for their competitive exams.

5.2 Student Support

5.2.1 Does the institution publish its updated prospectus, handbook and other student information material annually? If yes, what is the information disseminated to students through these publications?

This institution publishes updated prospectus, handbook, Teacher's Diary, College Magazine, News letter, and Manuscript magazines of the departments regularly.

The Prospectus issued along with admission application form contains the details of the courses offered, instructions to fill up the application form, eligibility for admission, admission process and other necessary details.

Hand book cum diary issued to each student for every academic year is printed in an attractive book form. It contains the Vision, Objective and Motto of the College, a short history of the College is also provided. A description about the congregation that administer the college, university norms, rules and regulations, endowment prizes and scholarships and space is also provided for including important matter on a daily basis. It also gives the list of teaching and non-teaching staff, working days and College anthem. The 'Teacher's Diary' is a handbook for the teachers to record all information about the students, mentoring reports, marks, internal assessments and all data regarding students. The Newsletter is brought out in every semester. This is revised twice in every semester.

5.2.2 Does the institution provide financial aid to students? If yes, specify the type and number of scholarships/ freeships given to the students during the last academic year by the institution (other than those provided by the social welfare departments of the State or Central Governments).

There are 48 Endowment prizes instituted by Retired Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff. Apart from this, the PTA sponsors the proficiency prizes for the top scoring students in every class. From PD funds scholarships are

given to poor students. SAF- Students Aid Fund gives financial support to students who are not supported under any other schemes of financing.

5.2.3 Give details of schemes for student welfare? (insurance, subsidized canteen facilities, special diets, student counseling support, "earn while you learn" scheme etc.)

Insurance – All the students of the college are enrolled in Personal Accident Policy with National Insurance Company Ltd.

Sports students are given subsidized and special diets.

Assist Prof. Mrs. Mini Mol K is in charge of Students counselling centre working inside this institute. Apart from this all class teachers and religious sisters as members of the faculty are available to help the students always. The counselling sessions carried out by medical doctors under the Rural Mission are available for the students.

"Earn while you Learn" scheme is made use of by 90 percentage of our students. Students offer tutions for the school students at home and earn for their study expenses. Some of the students are working in fish processing companies in holidays and earn money. Others are working as office assistants on saturdays and in the evening hours of class days.

5.2.4 What type of support services is available to overseas students?

As per the University regulations the intake of the Lakshadweep students is done as per the quota every year. There are a few students who are from the Gulf regions. They are given time of as per their schedules to renew their visa. They are provided hostel facilities and given counseling so that they can integrate into the main stream of the students. Even in summer holidays the hostel functions so that the students will have boarding accommodation

during the examinations and in time according to the schedule of the sailing services.

5.2.5 Give details of the placement and counseling services for the students?

The Career Guidance Cell and the Placement Officer, along with the Public Relations Officer of this institution arrange skill enhancing programmes and training on interview skills for the final year students. Grooming and soft skills classes are held for the students. Campus interviews with prospective employees are arranged. Students attend the leadership courses conducted by AICUF, NSS, NCC and other similar organizations and get the skills improved.

5.2.6 How does the institution encourage and develop entrepreneurial skills among the students?

The ED Club is effectively functioning in the college. It conducts seminars in collaboration with the Kerala State Entrepreneur Council every year. Student are taught to start a small business like soap making, dress making, fashion designing, cookery and DTP. An Entrepreneur programme is conducted for women in an around Aluva by the NSS unit in collaboration with Kerala Action Force and Social Service Department of the Archdiocese of Verapolly.

5.2.7 Does the faculty participate in academic and personal counseling? If yes, give details on services provided during the last academic year?

Academic Counselling is carried out through the respective class in charges. Personal counselling is offered through faculty who are mentors to a group of students. Details of all such activities are recorded in the teacher's diary. All the faculty members compulsory undergo two days seminar on value education every year which helps them in counselling.

5.2.8 Is there a separate guidance and counseling centre for women students? If yes, enumerate the activities of the centre

Being a women's college, all the academic and non academic programmes are concentrated on women alone.

5.2.9 Is there a Cell /Committee constituted for prevention/ action against sexual harassment of women students? If yes, detail its constitution and enumerate its activities (issues addressed during the last two years)

The handbook of the college provides the Ragging Prohibition Act 1998 for helping the students understand the legal aspects of ragging. The Kerala Action Force conducts programmes on regular intervals regarding sexual harassment. They are also given guidance as to who to contact regarding such grievances. The Students Council of the college along with the PTA brings to the notice of the Principal and staff if there are any such incidents. The Superintendent of the Police Rural is always helpful and guides the students to be bold and brave. The local police are helpful in this regard.

5.2.10 Does the institution have a grievance redressal cell? If yes, what are its functions? Detail the major grievances redressed during the last two years.

The Grievance Redressal Cell is an active body comprising a teacher in charge Ms.Mary Mildred and a Committee. It reaches out to the student needs and requirements and collects feedback regularly from students and staff. This cell takes up the complaints regarding rest rooms, toilets, office matters, canteen, teaching and behavior of teachers. Most of the grievances are sort out through dialogue. The short fall in facilities are noted and remedial measures taken when funds are available. The Anti-Ragging Cell is also incorporated into the Grievance Redressal Cell.

5.2.11 Is there a provision for acquiring computer skills/ literacy for all students, in the curriculum? If yes, give details on how it is imparted, and level of proficiency.

Most of the regular courses have a provision for computer studies in the curriculum. At the entry level in the first year of the degree course those students who do not have computer literacy are sorted out and asked to undergo a basic computer course. Hence all the students at the exit level are computer literate. The Departments of Physics and Commerce are giving Add-on Computer Courses.

All the departments are provided with computers and broadband internet connectivity. The Computer Centre is providing different courses from 9.30 a.m to 4.30 p.m. All the staff and the students are computer literate.

5.2.12 What value-added courses are introduced by the institution to develop life skills; career training; community orientation; good citizenship and personality development of students?

Certificate Courses are conducted under UGC scheme on Human Rights and Duties, Pain and Palliative Care Training conducted by NSS Unit of the College. A course in Computer Application is conducted by the Physics department. Courses on E-banking, Security Analysis and Tally, Communication Skill Training for the Communicative English students, training for producing documentary video plays, correct usage of language in the English language lab, training to conduct inter collegiate programmes are also carried out. Catechism and value educations classes for moral development and life skills, retreat programme for spiritual development, social outreach programmes for developing social conducts, study tours for better outreach, cultural programmes by the college Students Council with the help of various efficient teachers from outside are helpful in the personality development of students.

School going boys and girls from poor living conditions, selected from the parishes, where the educational agency is running schools are brought to this college on every second saturday and are given special coaching in language, life skills, soft skills, leadership and guidance for future career. The faculty of the college offers their services. This programmes is conducted for the upliftment of the backward Latin Catholic Society, in the

name of the foundress, Servant of God Mother Eliswa (REFORM- Renewal Educational Forum of Mother Eliswa).

Training is given to students to become good housewives. The various patrons like the OSAX and RELAX conduct tailoring, cookery and soap making classes. Career counselling and Personality development classes are also held.

The college conducts seminars on Traffic awareness, Legal awareness, best practices, Career guidance, Stress management and Yoga meditation.

Students are given chances to express their solidarity to the people in current issues and problems of the society, such as, interstate controversy for dam water.

Counselling sessions by medical doctors are given to our students to clarify their doubts, related to different ailments. They are given couselling for emotional problems and stress management.

Participation of students and faculty in community related extension and outreach activities such as visit to old age homes, orphanages, seminars on AIDS, natural birth system, building homes for the homeless are enhanced. The hostel facility is improved with special emphasis on quality meals. The students are mostly day scholars as they come from the suburbs of Aluva.

The Placement Cell is providing students with a variety of career options. Seventy five percentages of our students are opting for higher studies. Only about 10 percent seek the assistance of the placement cell. These students are given placement around Aluva.

 - Staff meetings, Staff day celebrations, Staff tours, College day celebrations are the occasions for promoting cooperation among the faculty. The faculty members who are trained in Soft Skills and Life Skills extent their services to the students of various departments. There are enough opportunities such as Feast day celebration of Manager, Principal and the Patron of the College for all the staff to come together for introspection and improvement. Annual retreat and workshops are conducted for the spiritual and moral empowerment of the faculty.

6.4 Human Resource Management

6.4.1 What are the mechanisms for performance assessment (teaching, research, service) of faculty and staff? (Self–appraisal method, comprehensive evaluation by students and peers). Does the institution use the evaluations to improve teaching/ research of the faculty and service of the faculty by other staff? If yes, how?

Every faculty member submits a Self appraisal form to the management every year. The department heads and the Principal countersigned the same. At the end of the every academic year the Principal submits to the Manager an evaluation of each faculty member regarding punctuality, commitment and responsibility. Student's evaluation is also considered. The outcome is analyzed by the top management and discussed with the concerned teacher. Motivation talks are organized to inspire the faculty and staff apart from the messages of the Principal on various occasions.

6.4.2 What are the welfare measures for the staff and faculty? (mention only those which affect and improve staff well-being, satisfaction and motivation)

Staff association for both teaching and non teaching staff is functioning in order to ensure corporation and moral supports.

6.4.3 What are the strategies and implementation plans of the institution, to recruit and retain faculty and other staff who have the desired qualifications, knowledge and skills?

The appointments to the permanent vacancies are basically according to the University norms. The advertisement and interview are conducted as prescribed by the University and the rank lists for appointments are made. The interview board is constituted as per the University norms. In the case of recruitment of Guest-Faculty also University norms are followed.

6.4.4 What are the criteria for employing part-time/adhoc faculty? How are the recruitment conditions of part-time/adhoc faculty different from that of the regular faculty? (Eg. salary structure, workload, specialisations).

Ad-hoc faculty is recruited as two categories.

- 1. Guest lecturer under vacancies for the regular staff the norms is based on the University stipulations. The workload and the corresponding salary are stipulated by the Government.
- 2. Guest lecturers for the shortfall due to retirement are recruited in the same manner. Qualification is based on the University norms, guidelines and the salary is negotiated.

6.4.5 What are the policies, resources and practices of the institution that support and ensure the professional development of the faculty? (Eg. budget allocation for staff development, sponsoring for advanced study, research, participation in seminars, conferences, workshops, etc. and supporting membership and active involvement in local, state, national and international professional associations).

The college has an active efficient UGC Cell which assists the faculty members to apply for faculty development and improvement programmes, Research projects, Seminars, Workshop etc.

6.4.6 How do you assess the needs of the faculty development? Has the institution conducted any staff development programmes for skill upgradation and training of the staff? If yes, give details.

The needs for the faculty development are assessed mainly based on the general feedback and suggestions from the stakeholders of the institute such as Principal, Head of the Departments, PTA members etc. The institute has conducted staff development programmes for the skill- upgradation and training of the staff. Demo classes on the usage of electronic communication devices, and equipments are conducted. Spiritual improvement and motivation classes are also conducted for the staff. The representatives from the faculty attend seminar sessions conducted by Xavier Board of Higher Education.

6.4.7. What are the facilities provided to faculty? (Well-maintained and functional office, infrastructure and other space to carry out their work effectively etc.,)
The staff room in each department contains separate seating arrangements for the faculty. There are computers and internet connection for all the departments. Intercom, mobile phones are provided for interconnectivity. Faculty members can use the Computer Centre of the College. Specific space is provided in the Library and Canteen.

The College gets financial support from the Government. The salary of the

teaching and administrative staff in the aided stream is paid by the

Government. There is provision for a small amount as maintenance grant

from Government. However, due to the vacancies of both teaching and non-

teaching staff in the aided stream which remain unfilled for want of

clearance from the Government, the management engages additional staff-

members for the smooth functioning of the College and their salary is paid

by management.

Including this salary, the maintenance of the building, electricity, water

charge etc., would be over 2.5 lakhs to 3.5 lakhs per month expense from the

part of the management.

The source of income generated by the College is Rent (from examinations

conducted on Sundays by different agencies), PTA and income from Self-

financing courses. The expenses over and above the income and the new

construction cost are also met by the management.

6.6 Best Practices in Governance and Leadership

6.6.1. What are the significant best practices in Governance and Leadership carried out by the institution?

In Governing the college, PTA is given an important role. They are free to give their feedback. PTA General Body Meeting is conducted in order to give an open forum for the parents and teachers to express their opinions, criticize the functioning of the college and to suggest progressive measures.

Individual classes are having class representatives to maintain discipline in the class rooms. Each department is lead by the Head of the department. A College Council is functioning effectively constituted by Principal, Vice Principal, HOD's and teaches who are incharges of various activities. IQAC is also influencing for quality improvement within the functioning.

Students Council, advised by two efficient teachers, conducts and directs all the activities of the council regarding art and culture. The members are elected as per university guidelines.

College Governing body consists of Mother General, Local Manager, Principal, Vice Principal and other nominated members gather frequently and discuss issues related to infrasture, appointments, admissions, alterations and all other matters related to the college.

Complaint boxes are kept in all the departments to receive the complaints and feed backs from students.

For Re-accreditation:

1. What were the evaluative observations made under Organization and Management in the previous assessment report and how have they been acted upon?

The IQAC of the college meet frequently to discuss various plans, budgets, quality and improvements to be made regarding mode of teaching and learning. The college by itself cannot opt for autonomous status as it has to get the permission from the State Government. At the conclusion of every academic year each department is preparing a plan of action for the next year and the college itself is having the practice of preparing budget for the coming year. Single window system for students is already instituted and the admissions are done through this system. External academic audit of the departments are

carried out during the meetings of IQAC, Open house, Progress Card distribution to parents, OSAX, RELAX, Counselling and meeting of the General Body of PTA.

A democratic leadership style where ideas and creativity flow freely in a free environment involving all the stakeholders namely parents, staffs, students and the public authorities. It focuses on human resources management and learning process including time management and quality control. The students are groomed keeping in mind the objectives and goals which they carry forward to the society. An open door approach is maintained at all levels. In the Xaverian family there is an air of politeness and warmth and the stakeholders enjoy their work and give their best during work hours.

The management encourages the staff to work on multiple areas on a voluntary basis in a quest to build cross functional capabilities. Here the staff know something about everything and everything about something. It gives a chance to gain from the different perspective of each Xaverian and diversity of thought will challenge old paradigms as they do not carry the burden of any legacy.

All Xaverians are committed to their work. The commitment and involvement of the stakeholders help in the growth of each person and is a catalyst for each individual to reach the tip of Maslow's Pyramid of self realization.

The management creates a pool of capable talent that is multi-skilled and it gives the college a tremendous competitive advantage of creating expertise in various cross functional areas.

2. What are the other quality sustenance and enhancement measures undertaken by the institution since the previous Assessment and Accreditation with regard to Organisation and Management?

With regard to Organization and management, the activities of College Council and PTA are strengthened, the opinion of all stake holders of the College are sought in improvement of activities.

Criterion VII: Innovative Practices

7.1 Internal Quality Assurance System

7.1.1 What mechanisms have been developed by the institution for quality assurance within the existing academic and administrative systems?

Within the academic system, the Semester system is introduced and the individual departments introduce new methods of evaluating the standard of students. Qualified and motivated teachers are appointed in the vacancies of faculty in various departments. Each department prepares the year plan for the next year with academic and extracurricular activities and try their best to implement their decisions. Each faculty is asked to maintain a work diary called Teacher's Diary. The IQAC is working as per the guidelines of NAAC. Changes in the time table of the class hours and the time of working of the library has been increased.

The facilities in the administrative block have been renewed and it is shifted to the ground floor for the effective monitoring of the functioning of the College. By strengthening the relationship between the staff and management the administration is made effective. Subsequent internal departmental grading is introduced to ensure quality and healthy competition among the departments.

7.1.2 What are the functions carried out by the above mechanisms in the quality enhancement of the institution?

The IQAC is the central committee which decides and plans all the activities of the college. The communication of these matters is made through the secretary of the IQAC to the College Council consisting of the HOD's, the student advisors and the staff secretaries. The management provides necessary infrastructure facilities and do not involve in the academic affairs of the college.

7.1.3 What role is played by students in assuring quality of education imparted by the institution?

The feedback of students regarding the performance of teachers and the functioning of the individual departments and the College in general helps in increasing the quality of teaching. The grievance redressal cell is facilitating the students to point out the deficiencies, inadequacies and complaints regarding teaching, infrastructure and administration. This helps the authorities to rectify the deficiencies when it arises.

7.1.4 What initiatives have been taken up by the institution to promote best practices in the institution? How does the institution ensure that the Best Practices have been internalized?

The service of the retired teaching faculty (RELAX) is welcomed for giving counseling and teaching vocational courses to the students.

The alumni of the college (OSAX) also is playing an active role in the extracurricular activities of the college.

Maintenance of Teacher's Diary

Departmental grading

Mentoring and value education

Annual presentation of the achievements and future plans of each department.

Open house conducted to facilitate the parents to have active participation in the academic and extra-curricular activities of the students

PTA has an effective role in the daily functioning of the College.

7.1.5 In which way has the institution added value to the quality enhancement of students?

The institution conducts organizes many career oriented courses, seminars demo-sessions, workshops and interview sessions for the quality enhancement of students. The departments conduct add-on courses in computer and soft skills to increase the proficiency and employability of the students. Apart from these seminars on life-skills help the girls to develop the right approach towards life. The retreat sessions give them spiritual and moral formation.

Inter College fests are conducted to increase the organizing and coordinating skills of the students.

7.2 Inclusive practices

7.2.1 What practices have been taken up by the institution to provide access to students from the following sections of the society:

a) Socially-backward

Special quota for admission is allotted for socially backward students. They are exempted from fees and scholarships are given to encourage them to study. Classes in Spoken English and Computer classes are conducted for the students from backward communities by the alumni association, OSAX.

b) Economically-weaker

A good number of Government, Social welfare and Institutional Scholarships are provided to economically backward students. All the 48 endowment prizes are intended for economically weak students having good academic achievements.

c) Differently- abled

Specific quota for admission is allotted for differently-abled candidates. Hostel facilities are provided for them. Special facilities to write examinations are also arranged.

- 7.2.1 What efforts have been made by the institution to recruit 1) Staff from the disadvantaged communities? Specify?
 - a) teaching

b) non-teaching

All appointments, both teaching and non-teaching, are made according to the norms of the University and Government. The College belongs to the Congregation of Teresian Carmelites which is a Roman Catholic Latin Christian Congregation for Women Religious. The Community of Latin Christian is both minority and disadvantaged. Minority

Institutions have the provision to appoint 50% of the vacancy from the same community. So half of the vacancies are filled with Latin Catholic persons but the quality of the candidate selected is also considered without compromise. SC and ST candidates can also given preference. Handicapped candidates are also considered.

7.2.2 What special efforts are made to achieve gender balance amongst students and staff?

The College, being for Women, only lady teachers is appointed except one staff in the Physical Education department.

7.2.3 Has the institution done a gender audit and/or any gender-related sensitizing courses for the staff/ students? Give details.

The women in the backward communities and in the rural areas are economically, educationally and socially backward. Upholding the vision and objectives of the foundress Rev. Mother Eliswa, the College is concentrating on educating girls and thus empowering the marginalized women folk for the building up of the society.

7.2.4 What intervention strategies have been adopted by the institution to promote the overall development of students from rural/ tribal backgrounds?

20% of the seats in each and every class are exclusively for the Tribal students only. They are given free hostel facilities. The Governments and Social Scholarships are announced in the College and all necessary steps are taken to guide the students to make their application at the right time and in the proper manner. The Career Guidance Cell gives information regarding employment.

7.2.5 Does the institution have a mechanism to record the incremental academic growth of the students admitted from the disadvantaged sections?

Progress Card of marks obtained in the internal assessment shows the academic growth. Tests conducted during the remedial classes for minority and SC/ST show the academic growth of students admitted from the

- disadvantaged sections. Assessment of the academic standard of the students by comparing the entry level with the exit level is done.
- 7.2.6 What initiatives have been taken by the institution to promote social-justice and good citizenship amongst its students and staff? How have such initiatives reached out to the community?

The objective and mission of the institution itself is to form good citizens. The foundress of this institution intended the education of girls to establish social justice in a society where women were considered as socially marginalized. The general orientation session for freshers and their parents in the beginning of each academic year is oriented towards good citizenship and to inculcate human rights and human equality. The Spirit of the great missionary and patron of the college St. Francis Xavier is deep rooted in the spirit of this institution. The college is very particular to reach out its activities for having solidarity with the local people with current social problems. The NSS and NCC units of the College are giving leadership in social outreach programmes. Blood donation camps, Kerala Day Celebration, participation in Republic Day parade and Independence Day celebrations, participation in Anti-Aids programmes and rallies, etc., are some of the reach out programmes regularly conducted in the college. Every year our NCC cadets and NSS volunteers participate in RD parade at New Delhi.

7.3 Stakeholder relationships

- 7.3.1 How does the institution involve all its stakeholders in planning, implementation and evaluation of the academic programmes?
 - Feedback and suggestions are taken from IQAC, teachers, students, parents, well wishers, alumna, and PTA for annual planning, implementation, and evaluation of the academic programmes.
- 7.3.2 How does the institution develop new programmes to create an overall climate conducive to learning?

The college gives importance to conventional as well as job oriented courses more acceptable to the rural girls and to their culture. The conventional courses are also much in demand by this society for teaching career and easy employment. Job oriented courses like BA Communicative English, B.Sc Zoology Vocational and M.Sc Microbiology are also high in demand. More student support activities are introduced and a safe atmosphere is kept within the campus.

7.3.4 How does the institution elicit the cooperation from all stakeholders to ensure overall development of the students, considering the curricular and co-curricular activities, research, community orientation and the personal/spiritual development of the students?

The disciplined, safe atmosphere that prevails in the campus and the teacher student relationship established among the students and the faculty, the cordial relationship between the management and the employees and the involvement of PTA are very conducive for Higher Education intending the overall development of the students. The management is highly supportive to the faculty improvement programmes. The students are given best opportunities

for curricular and co-curricular activities, community orientation activities and personality development programmes. Above all orientation sessions, value education classes, catechism classes, prayer sessions, retreat programmes are provided. The presence of the prayer room in the campus itself fosters spiritual development of the students and teachers.

7.3.5 How do you anticipate public concerns in your current and future programme offerings and operations?

Now the education given is not teacher oriented but student oriented with social outreach programmes. The girls are given programmes that have relevance to the society and broad acceptance. Specific awareness about the dangers of immoral trafficking, the dangers involving in the irresponsible use of Mobile phones and Internet are given. Medical and psychological counseling sessions is given. Voter's rights awareness is given in collaboration with the Government agencies, and the ID cards are provided.

7.3.6 How does the institution promote social responsibilities and citizenship roles among the students? Does it have exclusive programme for the same?

The institution is keen in training the girls as socially upright citizens. The college has taken many programmes.

- Every year NSS Unit and PTA construct and repair houses of poor students or alumina of this college.
- The whole College took up a demonstration along with the Kerala Action Force Volunteers and Jana Seva Sisubhavan in Aluva town to show the solidarity with the Mullaperiyar Dam.
- The NSS Volunteers participated in a rally conducted by Rajagiri Social Service School from Paravoor Kavala to Nedumbassery Airport as a protest against dumping waste by the side of the road.
- In order to help the poor patients in medical need, college conducts blood donation camps twice in a year and many students and teachers are regular donors, in collaboration with IMA.

- In association with Anwar Hospital, pain and palliative centre, the NSS unit is giving training to the girls in taking care of patients in agony.
- During 10 days' Camp our NSS volunteers make survey of the camp venue on literacy and submit the study report to the Panchayat for further developmental activities.
- The students visit the old age homes and special school in order to feel with and help the disabled in the society.
- Conducted seminars of hygiene and waste management.
- 7.3.7 What are the institutional efforts to bring in community-orientation in its activities?

The College conducted seminars on socially relevant topics such as waste management, social justice, legal aspects of life of ladies trafficking, traffic rules, Human Rights, personality development, pain and palliative care training, regular blood donation camps, red Rribbon club etc., are the open forums in community extension activities.

The students visit old age homes, orphanages, "sisubhavans" etc., on a class wise basis and as part of the activities of NSS, NCC, AICUF and Jesus Youth. Street plays are conducted by NSS volunteers to make the public aware of AIDS. Trees were planted in 300 houses in the village Kaitharam by our students on Environmental Day.

Under the leadership of NSS in collaboration with Kerala Action Force, College conducted seminars for widows, and practical sessions in making ornaments without gold in order to fight against the excessive attraction to gold. 700 widows participated in this event. On World Cancer Day, the ED Club as part of community outreach programme collected and handed over Rs.17000 to Pain and Palliative Care Centre.

7.3.8 How does your institution actively support and strengthen the neighborhood communities? How do you identify community needs and determine areas of emphasis for organizational involvement and support?

The students assisted the inmates of "Snehakoodu," (the house of homeless children) by providing study materials, library books, tutorial services and financial assistance.

Madhavapuram, adopted colony of the college is given Medical Aids and financial assistance for construction of House and awareness programmes on a regular basis. Social outreach programmes are organized with the help of NGO's, like Kerala Action Force, IMA, Alumni Association, OSAX, RELAX and PTA on a regular basis.

7.3.8 How do the faculty and students contribute in these activities?

The faculty act as organizers, instructors and facilitators. There are NSS coordinators, NCC Supervisor, and directors for all kinds of activities among the students. Students themselves find out the deserving persons and areas of activities.

7.3.9 Describe how your institution determines student satisfaction, relative to academic benchmarks? Do you update the approach in view of the current and future educational needs and challenges?

Through feedback from students their satisfaction is determined. Current and future educational needs are updated based on the demands of students and the parents through add-on courses and soft skill training. Friendly loving approach with discipline from the part of management and teachers, equip the students to meet the challenges in social relationship. The seminars on life skills, human values, human rights and spiritual values together with retreat programmes provide all possible means to meet the challenges and educational needs of the time. SMART class room facilities—using latest technology are introduced.

7.3.10 How do you build relationships?

- to attract and retain students
- to enhance students performance and
- to meet their expectations of learning

A campus culture with well disciplined cordial atmosphere and work environment is maintained in the institution which attracts and retains many students. In addition to the regular conventional courses, different job oriented courses are offered to attract the students. The management and the faculty make possible efforts to have low drop out rates.

Apart from the fees concession and the scholarships from the Government, the College also gives financial support to the financially backward students to continue their studies. The relationship between the faculty and the students is also a rich experience.

Majority of the girls from the locality specially from backward community join the College to get good disciplined education to lead a responsible life of a housewife and a mother in the future along with qualification to get employed. Along with class room teaching different seminars and workshops on life-skills and soft-skills equip a girl to be able to face the challenges of daily life in this fast changing world.

Brilliant students are having ample opportunities to develop their academic proficiency and continue their studies and appear for competitive examinations. NCC, NSS, Sports and Cultural events in Arts and Literature also provide ample opportunities for their integrated development, nurturing creativity.

7.3.11. What is your complaint management process? How do you ensure that these complaints are resolved promptly and effectively? How are complaints aggregated and analyzed for use in the improvement of the organization, and for better stakeholder-relationship and satisfaction?

The complaints regarding academic matters are addressed through a three-tier process under the norms of the university. There are also guidelines from the Government regarding complaints relating to discipline. Complaints of non academic matters are discussed in the college council and corrective measures are implemented. Individual complaints regarding students are discussed in the presence of their parents. The complaints regarding mischief makers intruding on the premises are dealt with by the help of police department. The complaints received from the students through suggestion boxes are analyzed and remedial measures are taken by the Redressal Cell.

 - Education is facilitating the integrated growth of an individual. Educating a
 girl is the same as educating a family and that is educating a society. The
 College contributes much for National Development by educating girls from
 rural areas, from backward minority communities and from financially
 backward families. The College equips girls to be employed and to earn
 livelihood and to bring up the next generation as responsible productive
 citizens.
 - By equipping the girls in Life-skills and Soft-Skills and in all modern technologies and also through integrated development of personalities the girls from rural India are attaining competency.
 - Value education and Mentoring included in Curriculum itself and various seminars touching all facets of life are given to the girls in the College and they are indeed building up good value system. It is proved by their placement and success in the future life. The Spiritual formation too helps the girls to get rooted in spirituality and to face the challenges of life without desperation.

- Computer courses, and learning and teaching introduce with the support of ICT enhances the usage of Technology. The Everonn Virtual Class Room is the most important one.
- The College is indeed trying for excellence. As part of it application for more UG and PG Courses in various subjects were made. More and more well qualified teachers are appointed. More job oriented courses are started to satisfy the stakeholders of the College.

Online Tools for the Public: On line tools like Flux Calculator & ISRF Calculator have been developed from the ISRF Model and made available to the Astronomical Society.

Inputs for UV Sky simulation: We have also used the ISRF model as an input for a simulation of the UV Sky which will be used for the mission planning and providing test data for development and validating software pipeline for two upcoming UV spacecraft *TAUVEX* & *ASTROSAT*.

Dust Scattering Model to study the nature of interstellar dust grains: We have

developed Single Scattering and Multiple Scattering Models to predict the level of emission from Galactic dust in specific regions like the Orion, Ophiuchus, Coalsack etc. and to derive the optical properties of the dust by comparing the model output with the spacecraft observations like *Voyager*, *FUSE*, etc. For this we have created a three dimensional model of gas & dust for these regions separately.

Work as DST Scientist under Fast Track Scheme for Young Scientists:

This was a three year project which commenced in October 2007 and concluded in September 2010. The primary goals of the project were as follows;

(i) Development of software and techniques for extracting and analyzing diffuse UV Background maps from *GALEX* Observations. Status – Completed.

- (ii) Validating these procedures to investigate the nature of diffuse radiation field and its sources particularly in the properties of Interstellar Dust Grains.Status – Completed.
- (iii) Synthesis of the work done & continuation of the analysis using *GALEX* all Sky Data. Status Completed.

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
